## VERY SAD STORY

**AN ISLAND GIRL'S SUICIDE.**  
NEW YORK, July 29.—(Special).—Elizabeth McCormack, aged 25 years is dead. She is a Canadian and said her father is in the customs and a sister in a Boston convent.  
She left a letter addressed to a man in St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown.  
At the Hospital she declared she had taken a drug.  
She came here three months ago and was out of employment and low spirited, PROBABLY FROM CARDIGAN.  
The deceased young lady is thought to be a daughter of Mr. John McCormack, Collector of Customs at Cardigan, who left the island for the States about a year ago.

### 25,000 MEN WANTED.

MONTREAL, July 26.—Latoche Tupper of Winnipeg, passed through here to-night en route to St. John and other points in the maritime provinces, to secure as many men as he can to work in the harvest fields of Manitoba. He reports that with the phenomenal yield this year at least 25,000 or 30,000 men will be required, and some of these he anticipates will go from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

### BICYCLE RECORD BROKEN.

SALT LAKE, Utah, July 26.—The one mile unpaced bicycle record, which has stood for three years, was broken on the Salt Palace saucer track last night by W. E. Samuelson, of Provo, Utah. Samuelson rode the distance on an eight lap track in 1,32 2/5, under rather unfavorable conditions. He clipped two seconds off the world's half-mile record of 55 seconds, but this record will not stand.

## SHOWERS OF FROGS

### Probably the Result of a Waterspout

### HUNDREDS OF HOPPERS

### Seen on Hillside by Mr. G. W. Ritchie—Strange Columns in Air.

The people of Prince Edward Island are being treated this year to a variety of meteorological and other experiences somewhat out of the ordinary, not the least interesting of which was the hail storm of Saturday last. It so happened that on the same day there occurred another incident of quite an unusual character. Mr. George W. Ritchie of Messrs. Carvell Bros. was on Saturday driving from St. Peter's to Mount Stewart, setting out on his journey about 10 o'clock. When between St. Peter's and Morell, he noticed ahead of him and in the general direction of Mount Stewart two dark columns extending upwards from the earth to the cloud above. These had somewhat the appearance of columns of smoke as they sometimes ascend from a chimney on a calm morning. Having once before seen a water-spout formed in Charlottetown harbor he noticed the similarity, but thought little more of it for the time.

On approaching Mount Stewart, and when perhaps half a mile distant from the village his attention was attracted by seeing in the road and about both sides of it a large number of young frogs, green in color, pretty nearly uniform in size, and about one and a half inches in length. Both their unusual number and their unusual location interested Mr. Ritchie. The place was dry, halfway up the slope of a moderate hill, and precisely the sort of locality where frogs are not usually found. How came they there, and why? was the natural query. Then Mr. Ritchie thought of what he had seen some hours before, that had borne the appearance of water-spouts. About 300 yards away from where the frogs were found was a mill pond, and such ponds are frequently the habitat of frogs in large numbers. Could it be that a water-spout passing over the pond had sucked up the frogs with the water, carried them along and dropped them upon the land? This seems the most probable and natural solution of the matter. At least this is the way in which scientists account for those remarkable showers of fish, or frogs which sometimes fall from above, and of which there are many well-authenticated instances.

The whirl-wind, the water-spout, the sand-pillars of the desert, the cyclone and the tornado are all related. Even a small whirl-wind will carry light objects high into the air. What is commonly called a water-spout is more common in tropical countries but is sometimes seen in Canada. The typical water spout is thus described: A spout, jet or column of water, specifically a whirl-wind over a body of water extending from the surface to the clouds. In reality, however, the phenomenon that is seen is the cloud brought down to the earth's surface by the rapid rotary motion of the vertical whirl, and it consists simply of a fine mist surrounding a central axis of rarefaction. At first the cloud has the form of a tapering funnel; then descending near to the earth's surface, it draws up the water for a distance into its vortex and imparts to it a whirling motion. The spout is then complete and appears as an immense column connecting sea and cloud, light in color near the centre but dark along the sides. Like other whirl-winds, the water-spout has a progressive as well as a rotary motion, its axis being sometimes inclined forward in the direction of the advance. After continuing a short time, generally less than twenty minutes, the column is dissipated, the lower part descending as rain, or a mass of water, while the upper part is drawn back into the clouds. The height of the spout depends upon the hygrometric state of the air, but is generally between 200 and 2,500 feet. It is common for a number of water-spouts to be seen at the same time or in succession.

There seems little doubt that in the case observed by Mr. Ritchie a water-spout carried the frogs up into the air very much to their surprise and dropped them upon the land in a miniature "shower of frogs."
