RHODES SCHOLARS GIVE THEIR LIVES

Always of interest to the people of the Maritime Provinces who have sent to Oxford scholars of ability, the Rhodes scholarships statement for 1915-16 has just been issued. The trust has pursued its policy of "giving leave to all scholars from the Dominion and Colonies who take service in the Imperial arm or the colonial contingents, with the right of resuming their scholarships when the war is over and they are free to take up residence at Oxford." There have been in residence in Oxford during the whole or part of the year, ninety four scholars of whom seventy-six were American and eighteen colonial. Of the colonials, five have taken commissions or enlisted after being in residence for part of the year and one at the close of the academic year, two have engaged in munition work, whilst six continued their medical course at the university in accordance with advice. Since the last statement was issued three Rhodes scholars from Nova Scotia have lost their lives:—W. M. Billman, 1913; H. A. McCleave, 1915; and V. K. Mason, 1914 one from Prince Edward Island, A. C. Collett, is missing. Fifteen Rhodes scholars have been killed in action or died during their period of active service. They were made up as follows:—Canada, five; South Africa one; New Zealand, two; Australia one; Newfoundland, one and Bermuda one. It is officially announced that the next election of scholars for the Dominions and Colonies of the Empire will take place towards the end of 1917. Twenty six new scholars (all colonial) were elected for 1915, of whom seventeen took military service with out coming into residence.

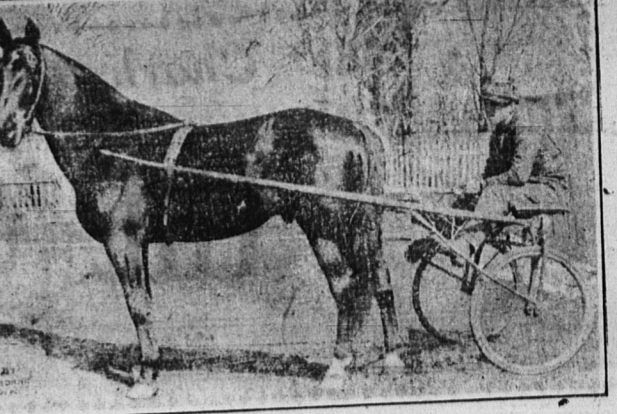

SERG. NORMAN LOWTHER RETURNED

(Continued from Page one) in words of welcome and called for cheers for the King. On the suggestion of Mayor Brown cheers were also given for the United States war effort. The country is the latest to range herself on the side of the Allies. The band then played "He's a Jolly Good Fellow" and the hero was conveyed to the home of his uncle, Mr. Peter Newcome, Brighton, whose guest he is while in the City. Seen by a representative of The Guardian last evening at Mr. Newcome's home, Mr. Lowther gave a few particulars of his war experiences. Notwithstanding all he has gone through, this young man, who looks to be no older than 24 or 25 years, is quite cheery and looks remarkably well. He was Principal of the High School in Kensington when the war first struck him in February, 1915—and carried him off. He enlisted in Kensington in the 7th C. M. R. and spent two months in England before crossing to France. His first taste of actual war was at Ploegstreet and Messines. He later moved up to Ypres where he got so close to the enemy as to receive a bayonet scratch on the left hand. This was in the third battle of Ypres. His division (the Third) left for the Somme in September, the big advance beginning on the 5th of that month. On the 16th after an enemy trench had been taken, while with an advance party of about thirty or forty men, a piece of shell struck Sgt. Lowther on the leg, blowing off his knee cap. He was being carried back to the dressing hospital that night, a distance of three miles, when a piece of shrapnel struck him on the right arm, making an ugly wound and buried itself in the cigarette case inside his breast pocket. The cigarette case undoubtedly saved his life. The force of this shot was so great that when he was blown off the stretcher on which he was being carried, he still retains the shrapnel fragment as a souvenir. Sgt. Lowther remained ten days in France after that in No. 1 Canadian Hospital at Etaples. He next spent four months in the Alexandra Hospital, Portsmouth, and afterwards was for some time in hospital at Ramsgate. His leg was twice operated upon, with the hope that it could be saved, but it was found that this could not be done and the limb was amputated above the knee. Mrs. Isaac Lowther of Kensington.
