TONS OF SHIPPING

Government Hopes for This Result from Commandeering Foreign Vessels

WILSON SES TRADE BOARD

His Visit Vivifies Rumors of Governmental Fixing of Material Prices

WASHINGTON—While the seas were not entirely calm today in the White House, it is known through Secretary Tumulty that final decision had not been reached concerning the wooden ship program and some of the other problems which have agitated all concerned for some time.

It is estimated that there is something over 10,000 tons of this shipping now under way, and that by the use of this power of commandeering and the hastening of construction the Emergency Fleet Corporation will be able to get perhaps 300,000 more tons in the water by Jan. 1 than would be possible under present conditions.

This would be a big advantage, the wooden ship advocates say, but would by no means provide cause for abandoning the project which they have from the first championed and now pressing upon the President with renewed activity.

There were reports some time ago in this connection that a big wooden ship program had been submitted to President Wilson and to the Council of National Defense before General Goethals was retained, and that it had been approved, and that there was something substantial to back up the belief that the President in the end would be favorable to carrying it out unless there was indisputable evidence that it was impracticable.

The discussion of price fixing by some Government agency received an impetus early this afternoon when President Wilson dropped in unexpectedly at the office of the Federal Trade Commission, and it is said talked over matters in general with Chairman Harris and other members of the Trade Commission is the body which Chairman Deiman wants selected to take over the consideration of a fair price for steel. General Goethals is reported, it is opposed to such a move, believing that a discussion by the proper committee of the Council of National Defense would be more to the point.

Details concerning the President's call naturally were meagre, but it is said that he sought general information about the procedure of the commission as it might affect steel, iron, and other products.

With the wooden ship program again in the limelight, the question of lumber prices was under discussion in some quarters, and it became known that a figure around \$35 1.000 feet was under consideration. Some of the companies, it was said, had pooled their interests at first and had sought to obtain \$43. The Lumber Committee of the Council of National Defense took the matter up, and finally a price between \$37 and \$40 was suggested.

More recently, through the activity of independent concern, it was said the price asked was \$35. The figure which the Southern Pine Association is ready to meet, according to one report, would rest in General Goethals and Mr. Deiman in the plan outlined was carried into effect by President Wilson, were much discussed today, General Goethals, it was said, had made it known that he had no desire to have any authority in the operation of ships, and this part of the program would be almost entirely under the present members of the Shipping Board, of which Mr. Deiman is Chairman, unless it should be considered wise to create another emergency corporation for that purpose. GERMANY WILL INDEX POTATOES IN GROUND

Scheme to Record Every Ounce of Growing Food in the Empire

COPENHAGEN—Military Germany long ago introduced a card catalogue system for men and live stock. Every male human and every horse and beast of burden was examined in peace time to determine suitability for military service, was indexed and cross-indexed so as to be immediately available at a desired place.

The system is now about to be extended to agricultural food products and applied to the harvest of 1917. Orders have been issued in Berlin to begin a giant card catalogue, in which all grains on the stalk, potatoes in the ground, the fruit of the trees, and other products will be entered, together with details of acreage, the number of individuals and live stock on each farm and the amount of food and fodder the farmer is entitled to retain for all purposes. This will be followed by regular reports through all stages of growth, harvest and delivery through to the hands of the wholesaler, the miller and the retailer to the ultimate consumer. The reports will be checked up when considered necessary by a test of threshings and examinations.

The system is introduced at the instance of the Prussian Food Commissioner, Dr. Georg Meichels, not only for the purpose of furnishing the Government with information on the food supply and to avoid erroneous estimates, such as proved near a catastrophe this spring, but also to prevent the agriculturist from

LONDON TOWER SLIDING

LONDON.—A report presented to the National Physical Laboratory at its annual meeting declares that the Tower of London is sliding into the Thames.

"Observations on the growth of cracks in the buildings of the tower have been continued," the report says. "There have been no serious disturbances, but careful examinations have revealed that movements of the wall have taken place, presumably in the nature of a slide toward a foot."
