Imports And Exports Of Wool

CITTAWA, July 3.—The next Bulletin of the Canadian Wool and Knit Goods Manufacturers Association will be:

Government figures just out of imports and exports for the fiscal year 1928, indicate that there has been a reduction as compared to fiscal 1927 of about 15 per cent in the amount of wool imported for further manufacture in Canada coupled with an increase of 112 per cent in the export of Canadian wool while the amount of Canadian manufacturers of wool into Canada were only one half of one per cent less than in fiscal 1927.

The imports of wool into Canada in fiscal 1928 was 13,895,679 lbs. or 2,277,483 lbs. less than in fiscal 1927; export of Canadian produced wool was 11,140,101 lbs. or 5,906,120 lbs. more than in the previous year; imports of wool tops were practically the same as the previous year at 7,685,081 lbs.; while imports of manufactures of wool further advanced than in the previous year at 440,928 lbs. a decrease in value of only \$255,435.

GOES OVER FALLS In Rubber Ball

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., July 5.—For the third time in history a man conquered the mighty Niagara Falls when Jean A. Lussier, French Canadian of Springfield, Mass., went over the Horse shoe Falls on the Canadian side in a specially constructed rubber ball, while a crowd of 150,000 people, lining the river bank on either side, cheered and applauded him.

The start was made from Cayuga Island, about three miles above the falls, at 2:30 o'clock, standing on the bridge eddy below the falls at 3:20 o'clock by William "Red" Hill, daring riverman, alone in a row boat. At first it was feared the giant ball might be carried downstream into the rapids. Lussier plunged over the brink at 3 o'clock. When Hill reached the ball it was right side up and it was a matter of only a few minutes until it was towed to shore and opened. The first to greet Lussier, with a resounding smack on his cheek was his sister Madame J. P. Cautiere, of Sherbrooke, Que.

The Windsor Meeting

(By W. H. Gecher) HARTFORD, CONN., June 30.—The purses for the four day meeting at Sage Park next week amount to \$48,000. The leading event on the programme is the \$25,000 New England Pacific Derby for which forty-four horses were named on March 17. It will bring out a large field as there are nine monies to be raced for.

The leaders in this race as shown by public form include Chattanooga with which Moshier won at Sturbridge in 2:06 1/2, Widow Grattan a winner at Sturbridge and Stafford Springs, the Canadian horse Grattan Bars with which Vic Fleming won at Sandusky and Mansfield in the Ohio circuit, the western star Kinney Direct, Bonnie M., and volo Rico. In addition to the above the starters include Gypsy Star, Jeanette Royal, Maud Grattan, Napoleon Star, Subito McKillop, and Peter McKinney.

The Windsor meeting will start Tuesday with a 2:30 trot in which Brnx will again meet Summers Worthy, and a few others. It will be sandwiched with the 2:18 pace and the two year old trot. The latter will be another spirited contest between Eugene McKillop, Miss Modesty, Paquita, Great Cantor and the new material that made its debut at Cherry Park.

On Wednesday the \$25,000 pace will be preceded by the 2:18 trot. It should prove a close contest between Belle Forbes and Edna McKillop with Lulu S. to keep them company. The afternoon's entertainment will be rounded out by the three year old trot. This race has proved one of the most attractive features in the Bay State Circuit this year. Plucky, Azure Volo and Shirley Harvester are new material known the limit before they take the word.

The fifth renewal of the Sage Park \$10,000 trot will be decided Thursday. Since it was inaugurated this race has been won by Fayette National, Ensign Tige, Minia Dillon and Guy Reaper. Twenty-six horses were named in this year's race. The lists include Cub Ortolan, Gordon Dillon, Guy Worthy, Lenko, Holy word Dick, Orto Manor, Patsy Leaf and Senator Stout. Until he began displaying the temperament of his dam, Gordon Dillon looked like the best. As a three year old he could not be started at Windsor. Peter Volo until luck trouble forced a let up. For two heats at Sturbridge, Gordon Dillon looked to be on his way for another favorable showing. Since then he has been given when turned in company. Two free for alls and the two year old pace is the card for the last day at Windsor. Bee Worthy looks like the best in the trot. Four youngsters are named in the colt race.

Steve McDonald Wins Fast Cleveland Bout

(Special to the Guardian) By Eddie Meade CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 3.—Steve McDonald, Nova Scotia lightweight celebrated his first Cleveland appearance by handing out a numerical beating to Frankie Stelmack in their bout at Olympic arena.

McDonald displayed terrific fighting power and scored four knockdowns during the battle, three of them for nine counts in the third round.

CAR UPKEEP PAYS

It was quite some surprise the other morning that I found Smith polishing the nickel on his bumper. He has taken remarkably good care of the car, but I had never seen him taking quite such an interest in its appearance.

"I'm trying to save my investment," he explained. "I never saw a bumper depreciate as quickly as a motor car."

"That is because it's the most useful thing you've ever owned," I replied. "A piece of furniture is something to look and appreciate locally to use. An automobile gets the roughest kind of use all the time, whether you run it or not. If you use it constantly friction plays havoc with the moving parts; if you put it away in storage rust has its fling. But a car that is run constantly, and cared for, is one that is good stored away. You don't remember too that a motor car that is used produces tangible results, and because it saves you money and enables you to make money you can hardly expect the investment to last forever. By fighting this depreciation, however, it is possible to make a car last twice as long as the average."

"That's what I'm doing a little polishing," Smith replied. "The bumpings have been getting rusty of late."

"Yes," I said, "and when you remove the rust you will probably find that the nickel has been eaten away. I pointed to a place he had just finished polishing as evidence. This is just a warning to get after a lot of other things before it's too late."

"I've been polishing the body regularly, if that's what you mean," Smith said.

"I see you have. The body looks a lot better for it. But the finish isn't everything. I wonder what valuation you would place on a car with a cracked windshield, three certain fasteners missing, a bad dent in a rear fender, the floor mat stained with grease, the bumper out of line, one headlight bulb burned out, a license plate loose, the speedometer broken and valves out of adjustment. You would hardly care to buy such a car, if you'd by any chance buy it if you would insist on bargain terms. Yet the actual cost of removing all these deficiencies of depreciation would amount to very little."

"I expected to point out several things about Smith's car which needed attention. The first was the car's body."

Whereupon Smith began polishing his tools away. "Guess that's enough for today," he said. "No one can beat depreciation, but I'm going to put up a stiff fight and I expect many more—most necessary years—I can get out of the car."
