AN ISLAND SOLDIER IN THE WEST.—The Oakland, Cal., Maple Leaf says:—William Kenneth Currie of Vancouver, B. C. is one of the hundreds of Maritime Province men who enlisted from the West and saw active service in the world's war. His brother, George, who formerly lived in San Francisco, and who was with the 10th Canadian Battalion, was killed at Lens, France, March 12, 1918, and at the time, did not know of his brother's death until a sister, living in Montana, wrote and informed him of the fact. William later erected a cross of oak, painted by a comrade who was also killed on the 8th of August, 1918. After his discharge from the army, Mr. Currie took a trip to his old home, Bridgetown, P. E. Island, after an absence of 32 years. Miss Sarah McLean, who for many years conducted a boarding and rooming house on Mission street, San Francisco, was an aunt of the Currie boys.

Synopsis of Provincial Four Fold Activities Educational, Social, Physical, Religious

- 1—59 Centres received 169 visits. 2—Boy Life Survey promoted. 3—Talks on sex education, booklets distributed. 4—Ten National Secretaries helped various departments, by visits 1919. 5—Student Work, Trevor Waye, president has done excellent service. 6—Young men leaving home, or arriving in province introduced by many letters through Y. M. C. A. 7—Military work, a Secretary gives full time during demobilization covering fold work service.

The emphasis this past year has been placed on Boys' Work and the promotion of this has been largely done through the Provincial Advisory Committee, a cooperative clearing house for Boys' Work by the Churches of the Province. 8—Seven Father & Son banquets, 588 attendance. 9—Fifty-three earn and give boys contributed \$287.00. 10—Summer Training Camp 76 Total attendance. 11—204 Decisions made for Christian service. 12—18 Centres, are carrying out four fold mid week programme enrolling 342 boys.

Robertson, Secretary of the Presbyterian Sunday School Board of Canada, made the following statement:— "The present Forward Movement was only possible because of the demonstration the Boy's Work had given the country of denominations working together in harmony." 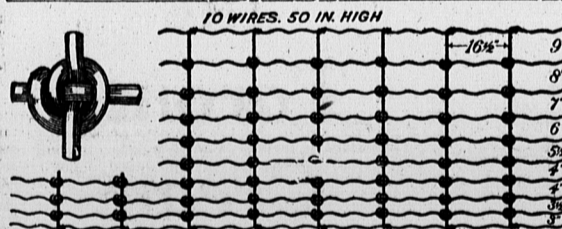

Continued From Page Four. covered the cost of the plumbing connections the first year. The housing question was the problem of the hour at that time and many families made their homes under tents till more comfortable quarters were provided for them. The hotels were unequal to the occasion of supplying sleeping accommodations for their guests and many of them were obliged to buy their lunch at the grocery rather than wait their turn in line at the dining room door. Each city had one or more arches erected with the word WELCOME brilliantly lighted with natural gas, and where the supply was very great natural gas torches prevailed in and about the territory newly piped. Under the circumstances I do not think that our progressive citizens can do too much for Mr. McKay in furthering or helping him to exploit the production of natural gas or oil in this province. If successful it would mean the doubling of the population in the province within a very few years and we all know what that would mean financially and otherwise to the province.
