AYLESFORD, April 28.—Last evening a serious accident occurred at the sectionman John Weagle, when a lighted gasoline torch which he and another man were carrying to the scene of yesterday's wreck, exploded, burning Weagle severely about the face and head.

CALL POLICE FROM VAULT

LAFAYETTE, Ind., April 28.—Stanley Rodbaugh of Jackson, Mich., was wounded this morning by police who were called to the National Bank by a burglar alarm, sounded by employees when Rodbaugh, after forcing the door into the vault, seized several bills of large denomination from the counter cash boxes, but before he could escape a detail from the police station, half a block distant, had arrived. He engaged the officers in a pistol fight, but surrendered after he was shot in the

shoulder. All the money was recovered.

CALLED "LOW DOWN CUR" FOR INSULTS TO ROYAL FAMILY

LONDON, April 28.—When a Communist member of the Glasgow city council last night began to rail against royal, characterizing it as an "inept, insane, brutal, monarchial system," and was hotly described by the acting chairman as a "low down cur," the council meeting broke up in white heat.

10,000 GRANT TOWARDS DIABETES TREATMENT

TORONTO, April 28.—Premier Drury introduced a bill last night giving official recognition to Dr. F. G. Banting and C. H. Best as the discoverers of insulin, a new treatment for diabetes, and putting aside, governed by the University of Toronto regulations, ten thousand dollars a year for Dr. Banting and Mr. Best for research work. Dr. Banting becomes the professor in charge and Mr. Best his assistant.

Nurse Carried Note For Mail Robber

NEW YORK, April 28.—Miss Coralea Ramey, a nurse, was a witness at the hearing yesterday before United States Commissioner Hitchcock in the proceedings for the removal of Abe Silverstein and Domenick Didato to Athens, Ga., for trial on a charge of assisting Gerrard Chapman, mail robber, to escape from St. Mary's Hospital at Athens. Miss Ramey told of Chapman's arrival at the hospital of Chapman suffering from the Atlanta pentitentiary and how, during her night duty in the hospital, she got acquainted with him.

She identified Silverstein and Didato as the two strangers who had excited the curiosity of the people of Athens. Later she came to know Silverstein as Abe Cohen and Didato as J. Krause. She said she first met them when she delivered to them a letter that had been given her by Chapman.

5,000 Bbls. Herring Still Held up by Ice At Bay of Islands

HALIFAX, April 28.—George Hunt made up 300 barrels of Scotch pack herring and shipped by the steamer Silvia. The price of Scotch pack in New York at the present time is \$10 to \$12 a barrel. There is quite a quantity of Scotch pack in the Bay of Islands, where there are no less than 5,500 barrels, which could not be sent forward owing to ice conditions. They will likely reach the market now too late and will have to be sold at a loss as the season for consumption will be over by the time they reach there. There are about 1000 barrels of Scotch pack in St. John's to go forward next week. The Alaska herring are being sent out of the New York market and the import tax of \$2 a barrel is a heavy handicap in getting a good herring. Mr. Hunt says that if we concentrate our attention more on the split herring trade to the West Indies, we could build up a good lasting and lucrative business and get from \$6 to \$7 a barrel. Only a few of the West Indian islands have been exploited, Mr. Hunt says, and if the government would employ a travelling agent to visit all the West Indian islands and draw up trade, we could sell at least 100,000 barrels there every year.

Two Bureaus Meet

BERLIN, April 28.—The meeting of the two bureaus, the one being the German and the other the British, which have just discovered a case in which two gangs of thieves had planned to plan the same "job" for the same time and came face to face inside the residence they were about to loot.

A brief consultation between the two bureaus resulted in an agreement to combine forces in plundering the place, on the understanding that the spoils would be split evenly. Teamwork made it possible to remove jewelry, silverware and linen to the value of 15,000 marks in the course of a few minutes.

Expect Return of Kidnapped Girl

SIMLA, India, April 28.—Sir John Mafey, chief commissioner for the northwest provinces, is expected to arrive in Peshawar today with Molly Ellis, the 15-year old girl who has been recovered from the band of Afghans by whom she was kidnapped.

Ruhr Rioters Shot By German Police

ESSEN, April 28.—A mob of unemployed men clashed with the police today at Katernberg, near here, in another outbreak of the unrest throughout the Ruhr which German officials attribute to Communist agitators. One man was killed and one badly wounded.

Navigation Opened At Parrsboro

PARRSBORO, April 28.—The northeast and north wind of the last two days have driven the ice out of the Basin and opened navigation in the new open Bay and navigation is now open from these parts and the Basin ports. Two steamers, one from St. John's and one from Digby, passed up the Bay yesterday. This morning two tern schooners, the Quac Queen for Boston and the Minas King for New York, both lumber loaded, sailed after having been located and frozen in since last December. Two others also lumbered, the Cape Blomidon and John Bracewell, will likely get away tomorrow.

Controversy Over St. John Collision

ST. JOHN, N. B., April 28.—It was learned today that a collision between the United States Shipping Board steamer, the Schoharie and the Anchor-Donaldson steamer Cabotia here, may be the cause of some controversy in shipping circles before the responsibility for damage is finally placed. It is said that the Schoharie when leaving the refinery wharf on the night of April 17 on her way to London and Hull with sugar, struck the Cabotia while the latter was lying in the stream waiting anchorage. The Schoharie had been in tow of tugs, but they had let go their lines. The steamer was in charge of a pilot. It is said after the Cabotia was struck the Schoharie also struck the Pinto a glancing blow but caused little damage. The Cabotia's plates were dented and the stanchions and bridge pole of the Schoharie were carried away.

Rail Rates on Coal Are Raised

PRINCE RUPERT, B. C., April 28.—Freight rates on coal from northern Alberta mines to Prince Rupert have been raised one dollar a ton. Dealers here have been notified of this effect by Canadian National Railway officials.

Bill to Amend the Criminal Code

OTTAWA, April 28.—A Government Bill to amend the criminal code was given its second reading in the House of Commons last evening. The first two clauses of the Bill repeated the provisions of the criminal code in regard to opium joints—leaving the subject to be covered by the narcotic drug bill recently passed.

Lenin's Condition

MOSCOW, April 28.—There was a slight rise in the temperature of Nikolai Lenin, the Premier, today. This was due, it is explained in the official bulletin issued this evening, to a slight catarrhal condition of the left lung. The bulletin says the patient's temperature was 99.3, pulse 110 and respiration 24, and that his general condition was unchanged.

Settle Lynn Shoe Strike

LYNN, Mass., April 28.—The strike of workers affiliated with the Amalgamated Shoe Workers of America was ended today and work was resumed in full in the forty-eight factories affiliated with the Lynn Shoe Manufacturers' Association. At an all night conference, arranged by Judge Ralph W. Reeve of the District Court, officials of the Manufacturers' Association and of the Amalgamated reached an agreement on all points at issue.

LONDON April 28.—Ramsay MacDonald's mediatory efforts in the dispute between certain Unions, Shipbuilding Industry Federation, Engineering Ship Building trades has been rebuffed by federation. The latter declined to meet the leader of the Labor Party on the ground that if collective bargaining is to be maintained constituent members of Federation must honor the agreements concluded between the parent organization and employers.
