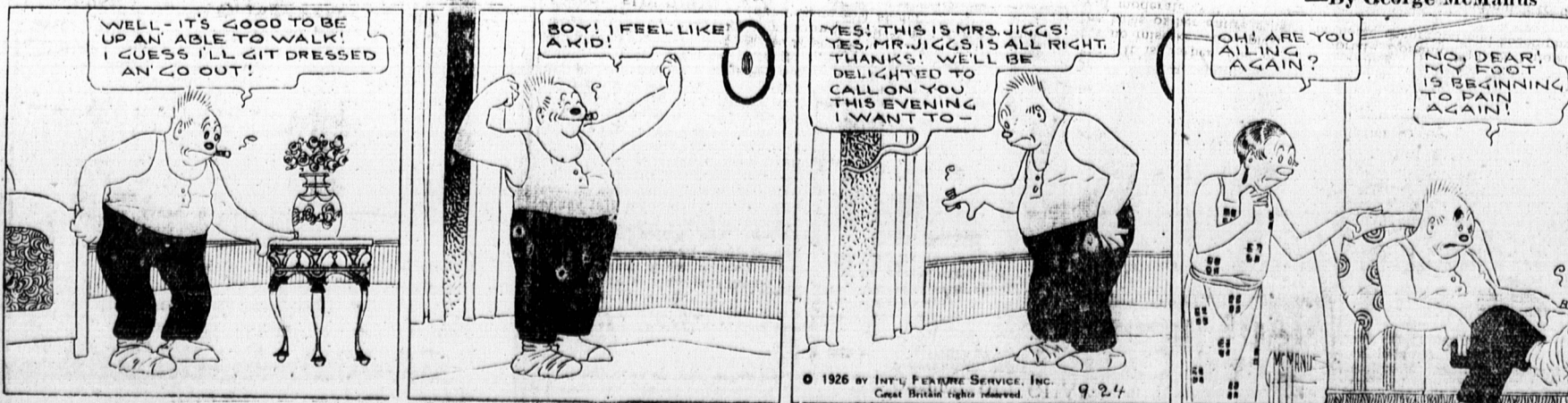

—DECLARATION DAY.—Tuesday was Declaration Day for the Federal elections in Prince County. The proceedings took place at Summerside in the office of the Returning Officer, Sheriff Wright, when Mr. A. E. MacLean was declared elected for Prince County by a majority of 1721 votes. The total vote cast were: For McLean, 7362; for Wyatt, 5641. The total vote was 13,074 out of which 71 votes were rejected and spoiled. Between 800 and 900 more votes were polled in Prince County this election than in the election last fall.
