**RAILWAY SHIPMENTS**—In addition to the potato shipments sent from this province by water, there were carried to the mainland via the railway and car ferry, 546,750 bushels (729 standard cars during the months of October and November. In that period there were also shipped 27,000 bushels of oats, 176 cars live stock, 8 cars of hay and 270 cars of miscellaneous freight. The live stock comprised sheep, lambs, live hogs, cattle and poultry. For the same period in 1920 there were shipped 711 cars of potatoes, 32 cars of oats, 102 cars hay, 160 cars live stock and 177 cars miscellaneous freight. For the year ending November 30th 59,810 passengers were carried by the car ferry at the rate of 4.967 a month, 1608 a week and 190 a day.

**MAIL DELAYED**—Owing to an accident on the mainland line near Bay Verte yesterday morning an auxiliary train had to be sent from Sackville to take forward the passengers and a wrecking train sent from Moncton to clear the track. As a result there was no mail from the mainland last night. The accident, which happened to the Toronto-Sackville train, was caused by the engine leaving the rails. Little damage is reported. The regular western mail arrived at 8.55 last night.
