TIMELY NOTES ON TOPICS CONNECTED WITH Silver Fox Farming

The 11th annual fox show was inaugurated yesterday afternoon in a blaze of glory, if such an expression were to be used. It was one of the most successful, unobtrusive, and profitable of its kind, and the management of Major A. S. Robertson.

Perhaps never since the show was inaugurated has there been more genuine interest taken and his has been well depicted in the excellent write-ups which have appeared in the press, giving an eye picture of what has transpired as well as a complete record of prize winners.

Judge George A. Callbeck, handling the biggest show that he has ever been called upon to judge, kept his urbanity and cheerful smile right through to the last. His was a task that few would care to undertake, and it is that they have created an entirely new type of foxes which fortunately has been named after himself with through visiting and handling similar types in dozens of ranches throughout Canada this season.

Whatever may be said as to the desirability of breeding white faces, this neck and the fact that they are sincerely believed that within limitations they will be money-makers—nothing that can be denied, and it is that they have created an entirely new interest and spirit of optimism among ranchers. Even those who are not interested in breeding them yet have an interest in producing the brighter class of silvers or even clear colored classes. Indeed, down to date specimens that may be crossed very successfully with ring necks, so the good breeder of silvers will come into his own even though he sticks to the regular channels, while those who divert to the new types will create a clientele of their own.

Congratulations to Lowell W. Hancock, president of the Silver Fox Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association, to the indefatigable secretary, Walter R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, and to the members of the committees who worked heartily and unselfishly for its success. Lowell is also to be congratulated for producing the finest silver fox book that we have ever had knowledge of. It is clearly printed on excellent paper and the illustrations are, without doubt, simply magnificent, showing in the clearest possible manner many of his most beautiful types.

The Directors of the show made no mistake when they included classes for non-registered foxes, technically known as standard silvers. The response of the breeders was good, a trout as it were, to see how their foxes would show up under the discriminating eyes of breeders who were there with pedigreed foxes. There were really many fine specimens of standard silvers, particularly from the ranches of Raoul Raymond, W. J. Jenkins, Dan Smallman, Ernie Mill, Charles W. Macdonald and son, Muten and Hamm, and others that could be mentioned.

That the admission of standard silvers will be on a larger scale next year is our confident prediction and that many more ranchers will be expected. It is to the advantage of all fox ranchers to see more of the unregistered breeds displayed because we know that in many sections of the country there are magnificent animals that have been in the words of the poet "Born to blush unseen" and all we ever know about them is when we hear of some individual getting a top price for a pelt.

Fred Colpitts, of the Colpitts clan, has been breeding and marketing marked silvers in Canada, with his nephew Russell Colpitts, M.P.P., were interested spectators through most of the show. They brought here for display over a dozen foxes from their ranches and had these in a very good arrangement at the corner MacLeod's garage, Gt. George Street. Hundreds of visitors came to see the types which they had seen in the past and many had never before been accorded an opportunity to view. Two of the foxes, a five-year-old sire and a yearling daughter, were perfect specimens regarded by many as equal if not superior in beauty and quality to the Norwegian platinum types. The foxes were unusual in size and heavily furred. The two platinum had white tipped ears and pink noses.

Mr. Colpitts started breeding these types some twelve years ago. The first one occurred in a ranch in Salsbury, N.B. They are divided into units and a ranch with 1500 pups usually has three permanent caretakers. The Thompson ranches eventually became world wide known and thousands of pelts from them have been marketed annually. Some years ago he made a trip to the Island, and purchased quite a number of foxes from Roy Woodside, which gave him excellent results. He was a great friend of the Colpitts, and purchased his original breeding stock from their Salsbury ranch. Only a few days ago he paid a visit to Salsbury and arranged for the purchase of a carload of the new type foxes. It was these foxes that we made mention of in our notes a few weeks ago as the most valuable shipment that we have seen over a Canadian railroad. To his family and immediate friends the writer of this column desires to express our heartfelt sympathy on the death of a fine gentleman and a man who was a credit to fox farming.

The foxes shown here were all kept on board floors during the winter. Therefore the pens did not need to be cleaned out as frequently. Their compartments are about even by ten. The pelting foxes are kept on wide bottom pens and very little straw is used which makes for less labor of course. At pelting time the foxes are taken out and placed in a large pen, and other help such as the five men who prepare the feed and afterwards attend to the care of the produce, the milk, and other chores around the big farm, are called in. Ranch management is handled in every detail and food is bought in enormous quantities at rock bottom prices. The foxes are fed on economy, due to the fact that Colpitts has paid big prices wherever he can pick up a freak fox, and has only a limited extent, until this season, cashed in. Their fox farming venture, like others the dividend have not been a great one.
