THE CHEERFUL MOSQUITO.

That the mosquitoes have come again is evident to anybody who will take a trip into the woods or along the borders of low, marshy places, where will be found convincing proof even thus early that the annual invasion has commenced, remarks The Vancouver Province. A few warm days and brisk winds will carry them away from their native haunts and into the habitations of men. The recurring visitation of these insects carries a different and more definite significance to the public than it did even a generation ago. In the settlement and development of the country our ancestors were doubtless more afflicted by these irritants than we are ourselves. But they regarded them simply as annoyances and not as a menace to health and even life. What they did not know did not trouble them. Their remedy was to grin and bear it, the same that they applied to many other problems, and the sign by which they conquered, though at a cost of many sacrifices.

But if science has confronted us with an unsuspected peril, it has also pointed out ways by which it can be avoided, at least in large part. These involve effort, often more of it than those most concerned are willing to give, but that is their lookout. When communities collectively and householders individually undertake to rid themselves of the pest they can generally do it. Thorough screening is but one of the very obvious precautions. Draining or oiling the stagnant pools, and keeping clean all receptacles where breeding is possible will accomplish much.

"While the fact is not generally known the area given to blue grass in Missouri far exceeds that of Kentucky's famous section," says George A. Crane, of St. Louis, in the Detroit Free Press. "Our blue grass is not native, but the seed was brought from Virginia and the soil and climate of Missouri seems to be just right for its development. It grows in abundance and is better than the Kentucky blue grass. In late years Missouri has gained much fame through its horses and mules and this grass is responsible for their fine condition. "At one time the raising of horses was not very profitable, but the farmers have no fault to find in these days when a good pair of either horses or mules will bring any reasonable figure asked by the owner. A novel electrical method of treating timber is said to have given striking results in France, and to have changed the greenest wood into perfectly seasoned material, says the Denver Republican. A water-tight tank of suitable size is required. The timber is piled on a large lead plate at the bottom until the tank is full, when a second lead plate is placed on top of the pile and connected to the negative pole of a dynamo, the bottom plate being connected to the positive pole. The space around the timber is then filled with a solution containing five per cent of resin, ten per cent of borax and a trace of carbonate of soda. On turning on the current, it passes from plate to plate through the wood, driving out the sap, and the resin and borax takes its place in the cells and interstices. This process being completed, the timber is taken out and dried, when it is ready for use.

SPONGE-FISHING WITH SUBMARINES.

(Harper's Weekly.) A monk of Tunis has invented a curious submarine boat for the benefit of sponge-fishers. He was led to do so by learning from a physician in Algiers of the surprising number of these men who fell victims every year to spinal paralysis. The boat is five meters in length by 100 centimeters in diameter and is operated by means of two large oars and an electric motor in the hull. In this way and with a further contrivance of wheels the submarine is able to go down into the water where, if desired, it can be worked at the rate of two and a half knots an hour. The descent from the boat that always accompanies the submarine is managed by means of a water ballast and the ascent by means of a tube that communicates with an air accumulator stationed on the boat at the surface of the water. The air turns away the water of the ballast and allows the apparatus to rise gently to the surface. The air from the accumulator permits the crews to remain under the water comfortably for two hours, in which time they can usually gather a great quantity of sponges and cover a good deal of sea surface. The system of closing the boat is perfect and no accidents have resulted in the short time the submarine has been in commission.

Perhaps the most marvellous part of this invention is the mechanical hand that is capable of being elongated or shortened at will and is so operated as to feel along the sea surface and take up the sponges. Then it can be further manipulated to deposit the sponges in baskets which when filled are sent to the boat above by an electrical apparatus. Electricity thus plays a large part in the usefulness of the submarine, the system of signals and other contrivances being complete. During the process of fishing the men in the submarine are able to see the sponges perfectly and thus to direct unerringly the work of the mechanical hand. The submarine is provided with a glass window and also with a complete system of mirrors and reflectors which can be adjusted from the inside.
