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REPORT OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1927-28 Mr. President and Gentlemen: I beg to submit the following report of the activities of your House Committee.

During the last summer, a complete examination was given to our building and a list of necessary repairs was submitted to the Board of Directors and on motion, authority was given our committee to proceed with all work.

Roof Repairs—Our roof had been leaking for some time and upon examination a large spot was found to be defective. This was renewed and there has been no leaks during the last six months.

Front of Building—Our building was badly in need of painting and many window sashes needed renewing. Several of the old sashes were replaced with new ones and all window frames and sashes throughout the building were painted, as was the front of the building. Our sign was also repaired and painted.

Gymnasium—Part of the room was painted and new light fixtures and guards were installed, in an effort to afford better light for volleyball and Badminton games. New window blinds were put on all windows in the gym. Some new plastering had to be done in several parts of the building where the old plaster had been dislodged by the playing of various games in the Gymnasium.

Basement—The wash-room, locker room, lockers and shower baths were repaired and many minor repairs made to bring them up to the necessary standard of efficiency.

Boiler and Heating System—Was completely overhauled, and many necessary repairs were made. One set of our wall heaters in the Gymnasium broke and had to be removed, but have not yet been replaced. Adopted as read, with the unanimous thanks of the Association.
