SEASIDE OCTOGENARIAN —Mr. William Higgins of Grandville St. was 83 years of age on Aug. 14th. He celebrated by waiving one and a half miles to visit his daughter, Mrs. Hazelton Gillis and returning in the evening. Mr. Higgins, who was always "light on his feet" has had a rather adventurous career. He went to Seattle, Washington before the year of 1893 and worked on the Northern Pacific Railway till the Klondike rush of 1897, when he pulled up stakes and joined the gold rush, crossed the "divide" from Skagway by the safer "White Pass" in preference to the "Chilkoot" which caused such loss of life on account of "slides". At Whitehorse the prospectors had to negotiate Miles Canyon and Whitehorse rapids near the source of the Yukon, or pay \$100 to get their provisions ferried down by professional "whitewater men". Mr. Higgins, who had experience in handling dorries on the North Shore of P.E.I. in northeastern had few chances in his own ability to "shoot" the rapids, which he did, accompanied by James McGinnis and Mrs. McGinnis, former natives of this province. Mr. Higgins is one of the few men alive now who performed the hazardous feat. Ad multos annos.—S

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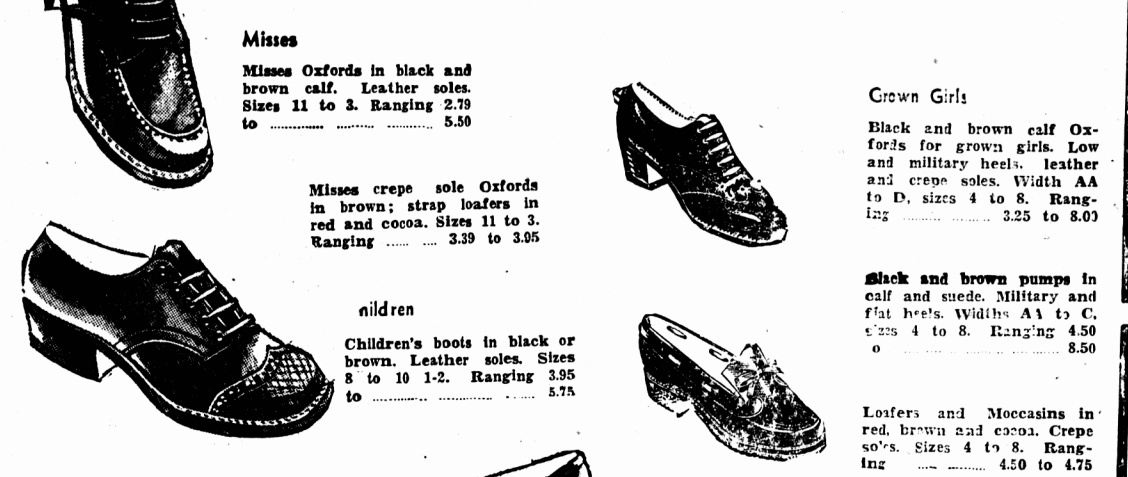
