Nazis Organize Air Corps, Violate Versailles Treaty

(By Melvin K. Whiteleather, Associated Press Foreign Staff)
 (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
 BERLIN, March 11—Germany's civilian "Air Sport" Association was placed under direct orders of the Reichswair (regular army) department today, thus becoming part and parcel of the Reich's defensive forces.

By this action the air clauses of the Treaty of Versailles were said on good authority to have been swept aside.

The change, effective as from today, became known in foreign official circles. Military attaches of

signatory powers of the Treaty of Versailles, it was reported, will be called together March 23 and informed of the change.

Germany is forbidden a military air defence corps under the treaty. An official intimation was given in advance to British and Italian air attaches today that Germany now possesses an air defence corps.

Officials of the department of General Hermann Wilhelm Goering, Minister of Air, were represented in other quarters as believing the psychological moment has arrived for announcing the new development.

NRA DRAWS HEAVY FIRE

U. S. Senators Request Fuller Information Re Operation.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
 WASHINGTON, March 11.—The cross-fire on NRA from both Liberal and Conservative elements in the United States Senate gained such momentum today that the current investigation of the recovery organization appeared a definite threat to the agency's future. From indications today the inquiry will go on indefinitely. The organization expires June 16 unless legislative provision has been made for its continuance meanwhile.

Despite administration efforts to speed up the hearing, Senators deluged Donald Richberg, director of the National Emergency Council, with requests for further information on the operation of NRA, demanding at the same time that
