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RECRUITING MEETINGS IN PRINCE COUNTY

At all important Centres From Tignish to Wellington a Splendid Response was Made to the Appeal for Men, 61 Stalwarts Having Joined the Colours.

BIG CAPTURE OF PRISONERS BY SERBS 750 Officers and 40,000 Soldiers Land at Marseilles

MARSEILLES, Dec. 17.—Seven hundred and fifty Bulgarian, German and Austro-Hungarian officers taken prisoners by the Serbians and forty thousand soldiers captured in Serbia, arrived here during the night on their way to a concentration camp.

ALBERTON.

The meeting at Alberton was a great success, and as a result of the efforts of the speakers eleven recruits were secured. Rev. Dr. Fullerton presided, and addresses were given by Mayor Agnew, Rev. PATRIOTIC MEETING AT BRADALBANE

Three Young Men Volunteered from this Section.

A patriotic meeting was held last night in the Hall at Bradalbane, at which there was a very large attendance, the hall being overcrowded. Mr. J. Gordon McKay ably presided and with him on the platform were sixteen men of the 105th, who had already enlisted from Bradalbane and vicinity, and a local choir, together with Col. Allen, Capt. The Misses McKay and McKenzie and Mr. Shaw gave splendid patriotic recitations, and Mr. Haslam, Mr. McLeod and Mr. Walter Pound, who were the soloists of the evening, gave excellent renditions of patriotic songs. The meeting closed with the National Anthem. After the meeting the sixteen soldiers of the 105th who were on the platform and the new recruits were royally entertained at the hotel.

U.S. STEAMER WENT DOWN IN STORM Crew of the "Lucy Neff" Reached New York in Safety

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Captain Loughrane and crew of 18 of the American steamer Lucy Neff, which foundered early yesterday 20 miles East of Fenwick Island, off the Delaware coast, arrived here today on the British steamer Chasehill. Captain Loughrane said he sailed from Palmouth, Jamaica, on December sixth with a full cargo of logwood, which was reserved for American dye makers. After encountering high seas and terrific gales for several days, the Lucy Neff sprang several leaks on the night of December 14, and although the freighter was in constant danger of sinking the crew remained on board until the Chasehill came to their assistance. Ten minutes after the last man had left the Lucy Neff, she sank. The freighter was 946 tons gross, and was owned by C. L. Dimon of New York.

AUSTRIA'S REPLY TO U.S. VERY UNSATISFACTORY

United States will Give Austria one More Chance, and Then? Germany Approves of Note, which is said to Hit Nail on Head. Diplomatic Relations are Endangered.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The United States will regard Austria-Hungary's reply to the American note regarding the Ancona as being entirely unsatisfactory and unacceptable should the official text, which is to be made public, be identical with the unofficial version received in press despatches from Amsterdam and London. Persistence by Austria-Hungary in the course she apparently has determined to pursue, would result in the severance of diplomatic relations between the United States and the Vienna Government. This step would not be taken by the United States, however, it was authoritatively stated to-night, without one more communication being despatched to Austria-Hungary.

The United States is described as being prepared to insist that Austria-Hungary promptly comply with the demands for disavowal of punishment of the submarine commander, and reparation by payment of indemnity for the destruction of the Italian liner, making exacting the right note, and the immediate breaking off of relations.

A second note, it is said, would deal in a discussion or exchange of views, would be of even a more insistent nature, as to the expectations of compliance without further delay. The state department to-night had no official information from its own sources that Ambassador Penfield at Vienna had been handed the reply. From Baron Erich Zwiadineck, charge of the Austro-Hungarian embassy here, came the information that the reply had been delivered. NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—A cable from London this morning to The Herald says:— "The Daily Telegraph correspondent telegraphs:— "Grave revelations are made concerning the regime of terror in Gorizia. Two Americans, members of a shareholders' banking firm, which stopped payment of bills, were summoned before the Austrian authorities and were ordered to resume payment. They declined and were accused of receiving a letter from America hostile to the Austrians. They were taken before a court martial, and condemned to death. They were executed as spies and all their valuables and bank deposits were confiscated. It is understood Washington has the facts in the latest out-gate. NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—A Washington despatch to The Herald says:— "Officials here this morning would not comment on the reported shooting by Austria of two American bankers as spies. It is evident from every word and action of the State Department officials, however, that the situation with relation to Austria, is one of extreme seriousness. NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—That Austria's reply to the American note is a quibble and that Washington will not permit the delay in the settlement of the Ancona case which Vienna obviously seeks, is the verdict of American newspapers generally. BERLIN, via London, Dec. 17.—Seldom has a diplomatic document of a war series met with such general approval in German circles, as the answer of Baron Burian, Austrian Minister of Foreign Affairs, to the note struck exactly the right note, and the Ancona case. The reply is regarded not only as a success in fighting weak points in Secretary of State Lansing's logic, but as a dignified reply to the American demands for a prompt disavowal and punishment of the commander of the submarine which sank the Ancona. The German note in the Lusitania correspondence all had their critics, some finding Germany too conciliatory and others insufficiently adept, but the general opinion expressed in political circles, is that Baron Burian struck exactly the right note, and by inclining Washington to enter on an interchange of views and submit some proof for the charges shifted the onus of defence to the shoulders of the American Government.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—Recent heavy rains to the Northwest of Ypres and the digging of new trenches, resulted in the finding of many bodies of Canadians who fell during the battle of Langemarck. A British officer says that about a score of identification discs may clear up the mystery of some of those missing, yet not reported prisoners of war.
