### DR. FRASER RESIGNS

The following is taken from the News and Courier of Charlottetown, S. C., April 5th. Dr. Fraser is a native of Alberton, P. E. Island and a cousin of Dr. C. J. McMillan, of McGill University.

The Rev. J. Keir G. Fraser, D. D., pastor of the second Presbyterian Church, announced to his congregation yesterday morning that it is his purpose to retire from the pastorate of the church at the end of June. While Dr. Fraser's intention was known to a few of his intimate friends, the announcement came as a shock to the largest portion of the congregation, between whom and their pastor there existed a tie of deep affection. He gave as his reason for leaving a desire to have a year's release from ministerial responsibilities and also the necessity of his living in a more favorable climate. In this he said he is following the advice of physicians.

Dr. Fraser has been pastor of the Second Church for nearly thirteen years and during this time the church has made advances in every department of work. It has undertaken the support of a missionary in China and assumed the responsibility of home mission work, and has been aggressive along many lines of Christian effort. It is now regarded as one of the most active churches in the city.

In announcing his resignation Dr. Fraser attributed any success that he had had to the loyalty and co-operation of his congregation. He said in part: "I never want to serve a more loyal church than this. You have stood behind me in every plan that I have proposed looking to the good of the church and the interests of the Kingdom. I believe I shall never look back to the years I have spent in this church as the happiest years

of my life, and I doubt if ever again I will learn to love a people as I have learned to love you." Dr. Fraser was born in Prince Edward Island, Canada. He was educated in Dalhousie University, Nova Scotia, and the Presbyterian Theological College, Montreal. He afterwards studied in Union Theological Seminary, New York, and received from the University of New York the degree of bachelor of divinity. Seven years ago the 'Presbyterian College of South Carolina' honored him with the degree of Doctor of divinity. Dr. Fraser will spend the summer months in Eastern Canada, where his plans for the coming winter will be formed. His leaving Charlottetown will be a source of regret to his numerous friends in the city.

### MRS (DR) ALLAN

It is safe to say that for many years no death has caused so much genuine sorrow in this community as the recent passing away of Mrs. Allan, wife of Dr. Allan of Cardigan Bridge. The deceased, whose maiden name was Anne Hughes, was born at Tignish about fifty years ago, and for more than half that time resided at Cardigan where she won the esteem and affection of all who made her acquaintance. She was a person of quiet and gentle disposition, who looked well to the ways of her household, and performed with a constancy begotten of faith the various duties of wife and mother. More than a year ago her health began to fail and for the last few months she was a confirmed invalid; but she bore her sickness in a spirit of resignation that charmed and edified all those whose privilege it was to be admitted to her bedside. Whatever her suffering no complaint passed her lips. Even in moments of the most exquisite pain, she never murmured, but met the attentions of those who waited

upon her, with a patient smile, or a whispered word of thankfulness. Thus with peace in her heart and prayer on her lips, she trod the royal road of suffering, comforted by the rites of Holy Church, and cheered by the unremitting care of her family and friends, till Sunday, April 11th, at the hour of three in the afternoon, she calmly passed away, her peaceful death being a fitting end to her gentle and unobtrusive life. Neither doubt nor fear came to disturb her beautiful soul at that solemn moment, but calmly as an infant soothed to sleep in a mother's arms, she passed from the cares of life to the possession of that peace "that surpasseth all understanding."

"We watched her breathing through the night. Her breathing soft and low. As in her breast the wave of life kept heaving to and fro. Our very hopes belied our fears. Our fears our hopes belied. We thought her lying when she slept. And sleeping when she died."

Besides her disconsolate husband she leaves to cherish her memory a family of five children, viz.:—James, with W. A. Pooch & Co., Lower Montague, Emmet, who recently enlisted for the overseas service and Victor and Stella at home. Her funeral took place on Tuesday, the 13th inst., and was attended by a large concourse of people made up of all classes and creeds, who, despite the adverse conditions of the roads, had come to show by their presence their esteem and affection for the deceased. After High Mass in All Saints Church, her remains were borne to the adjoining cemetery and there laid to rest with the solemn prayer of the church mingled with the sobs and tears of her grief-stricken family and friends.

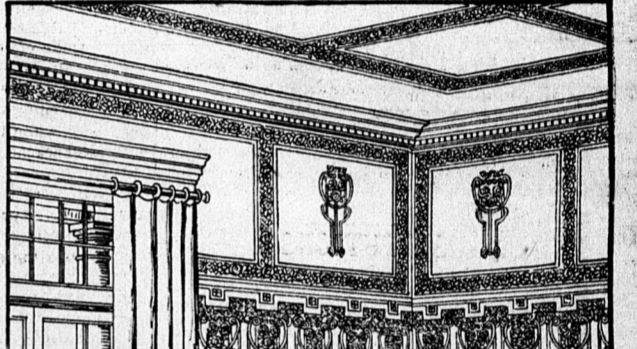

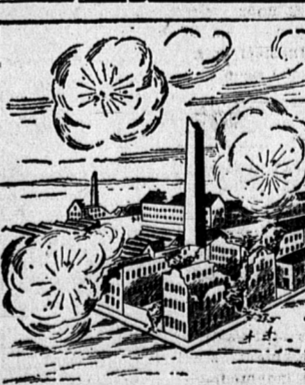
