## Maroons Entrenched In Second Position Swamping New York Americans 8-2

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) **FORUM, Montreal, Dec. 6.**—A speedy Montreal Maroon team that could not seem to do anything wrong tonight sped to an 8-2 win over New York Americans to mark up their fifth straight win of the season and consolidate their hold on second position in the Canadian section standing of the National Hockey League.

American were weakened by the absence of their star centre, Normie Hines, out with a broken jaw, and by injuries to Red Dutton and Bill Brydge, on the defence. The Maroon third line of Tooley Smith, Gus Marker and Herb Cain started a relay from Montrealers, the veteran Smith garnering five assists for himself.

Maroons opened up right from the start, scoring twice in the first three minutes when Cain netted the rubber on Smith's pass and Shields followed a minute later with a goal on a relay from Baldy Northcott and Paul Haynes.

A lucky goal that bounced into the net off Baldy Northcott's stick midway through the first period brought Americans up to within a goal of the Maroons but they failed to seriously threaten from that time until the end of the game. Eddie Burke drawing an assist, Stew Evans scored on Smith's pass a few minutes before the end of the period.

The Americans defence tightened perceptibly at the start of the second but weakened again beneath a steady Maroon attack and before the period ended Earl Robinson and Gus Marker had widened the Maroon margin by four goals. This lead was reduced slightly at the 16-minute mark by the New Yorkers' only other goal as Red Dutton, tall on Art Chapman's pass.

Three goals constituted Maroons' effort in the final period, two of them by Gus Marker and the other by Blinco on a pass from Earl Robinson. Smith and Cain both helped Marker to score.

As the score indicates, Maroons had a wide margin on the play. Workmen called on to make 27 saves, most of them from close in front, while Connell stopped 17 shots.

## GOMEZ HEADS HURLERS IN HONORS

**Yankee Southpaw Has 26 Victories Against Five Losses— Holds Other Records.**

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) **CHICAGO, Dec. 6.**—He couldn't pitch New York Yankees to the American League championship all alone, but Vernon Gomez, Manager Joe McCarthy's prize southpaw, accumulated a large share of the hurling honors.

Gomez led the league in victories, 28 against five defeats, and had the best earned run average, 2.33. In addition, although far from being the huskiest moundman in the circuit, he pitched the most innings, 282, led in complete games with 25, and on nine occasions held his opposition to five hits or less.

He also struck out 158 batsmen, for the leadership in that department, and did not hit a man.

Lynwood ("Schoolboy") Rowe, ace of the champion Detroit Tigers, was runner-up to Gomez in the percentage column with 24 victories and eight defeats, while Mel Harpner, ace of the Boston Red Sox, had the second best earned run mark, 2.61.

## ABANDON

(By George Hambrton, Canadian Press Staff Writer) **LONDON, Dec. 6.**—The House of Commons and the British public generally today hailed Britain's decision to join in maintaining order in the Saar, during the critical plebiscite period, as marking a change in national policy heralding more active steps towards keeping the peace in Europe.

Both Labor and Liberal oppositions had words of commendation for the British Government's decision when it was outlined in the House this afternoon by Foreign Secretary John Simon, who stressed the offer of British troops was conditional on agreement by both France and Germany not to join in the international force, as interested parties. Both France and Germany have signified their assent, he added. It marked a surprising reversal of British policy. Only a month ago Sir John had firmly declared there was never any question of Britain's sending troops to the Saar, the little Franco-German border region which votes Jan. 13, whether to return to Germany, join France or stay under the League of Nations.

Reach Accord Since that announcement France and Germany have reached agreement on all questions connected with the plebiscite and the disposition of French holdings in return to Germany, as expected. France has furthermore expressed her intention to keep French troops out of the territory and let an international force under the League handle the situation, providing of course that Germany was similarly willing to keep hands off.

The German assent was forthcoming today and consequently it was expected the international military force would be rapidly organized and sent into the Saar. Sir John Simon today did not estimate the strength of the British contingent, but it seems likely that an infantry battalion will be sent, joining troops from Italy and perhaps other countries.

All sides of opinion except Lord Beaverbrook's Imperialist press joined in commending the change in policy as not only an indication of Britain's determination to move actively for maintenance of peace but as strengthening the authority of the League of Nations in a more concrete way than ever before. This will be the first international force the League has ever had under its control.
