THE TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

The Examiner, which from the first has opposed the efforts of the merchants, business men, Board of Trade and THE GUARDIAN to secure an improved telegraph service for Prince Edward Island, now breaks into a paroxysm of delight, because nothing has been done to improve the service. Of course it abuses this journal in its usual fashion, but that harms no one so much as the Examiner itself. What is of some little interest is the views which the Conservative organ puts forward as to our present needs in telegraphic matters. After all these years of agitation on the part of the public and of obstruction on the part of the Examiner it has at length discovered that we ought to have "lower rates for day telegrams."

Of course the Examiner blames the Government of the day, as it is its duty to do, and as THE GUARDIAN has repeatedly done, for not bringing about some needed changes. But there was a time when the Examiner's own party was in power for eighteen years and that journal neither asked, nor did its party grant the required concessions. We blame both parties for what has long been a shameful neglect in tolerating the existing exorbitant charges. But it will be of interest further to note what the Examiner, speaking for the Conservative party, as it does, has to say in regard to the telegraphic situation. We quote:

"A night service is not much needed—except by THE GUARDIAN. . . . We have repeatedly pointed out that there is but one way by which this concession can be obtained. We might as well talk to the wind as threaten the Anglo-American Telegraph Company. To withdraw their present subsidy and trust to the competition of other telegraph companies would be decidedly risky under existing conditions. The only safe alternative is to add a thousand or two thousand dollars a year to the subsidy which the Anglo-American receives."

The first sentence above quoted must make every intelligent, progressive Conservative in Prince Edward Island blush for his party organ. A night service not needed! A twelve hour service out of twenty four good enough! This is the estimate of the Examiner as to what is good enough for Prince Edward Island at the end of the nineteenth century. There is not a business man who lives by his business, not a tourist who visits our shores who will endorse such a proposition. The very Chinese laundrymen in our city have more progressive views than the organ which scandalises by its obstructiveness the party it professes to uphold.

What the Examiner has to propose is apparently that the subsidy to the Anglo-American Company shall be increased by one half, or doubled, that the day rates be reduced and the twelve hour service continued. What do the intelligent, progressive Conservatives of Prince Edward Island think of the proposal? It is put forward on what is believed to be the eve of a general election. Surely the Conservatives of the Island will not willingly permit the people to believe that this would be their telegraphic policy if they were restored to power!

Those who remember the days when the Macenzie Government was in power—the first Liberal Administration in the then new Dominion—will remember that many of the by-elections during the term 1874—8 inclusive were carried by the Opposition. As a matter of fact there were seventy three by-elections in that time during which the Conservatives carried seventeen seats for which Liberals had been elected it 1874. This reduced the Liberal majority in the Commons by 34 before the general election of 1878 was brought on. The general election of that

year followed the trend of the by-elections and gave a sweeping Conservative majority, the new house standing 137 Conservatives to 69 Liberals.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

And Its Attractions to Tourists.

Prince Edward Island's summer climate is delightful, and the scenery is beautiful and quietly picturesque. Surrounded by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, it enjoys all the coolness of the sea breeze, and the advantages that can only be derived from sea bathing, at about 65 degrees.

Charlottetown has over 12,000 inhabitants, and is the capital. It has many great retail stores, besides a large wholesale trade. It has a Gas Light and Power Company, two Electric Light plants, and a street railway is in embryo. It has a first class water works and sewerage system. It is famed for its wide and shaded streets, its many pleasant drives, the principal of which is the new Park Boulevard, its attractive surroundings, pure water and clear, cool and bracing air. It is widely known as one of the healthiest cities in Canada. It has two hospitals, many churches and a large and elegant new Opera house. It also has several fine public buildings and a market which is one of the chief sources of the citizens' here. It has one of the largest and best equipped pork-packing establishments in the Dominion. On its west side sVictoria Park—a favorite summer resort—while on the east are the magnificent new Exhibition Buildings and Driving Park. Chief among its public squares s Queen Square in the centre of the city, beautifully laid out with blooming plants of every description, fountains, and well arranged walks, and enlivened with a band of music during the summer evenings. The rural scenery in the vicinity of Charlottetown is charming, and horses for driving are abundant at very low prices. Boats can also be hired, and steamers run regularly on the bays and rivers, affording most pleasant excursions. The principal hotels are Davies, Queen, and Revere.

Summerside has about 3000 inhabitants. It is situated on beautiful Bedeque Bay. It has the largest and finest departmental store in the Maritime Provinces, besides having other large retail stores. It has an Electric Light Plant, and a water works system and sewerage are being agitate for. The hotels are—Clifton, Queen, Russ Strathcona and Campbell.

Georgetown and Souris have a population of about 1,000 each. In the former are the Aitken, and Tapper hotels and in Souris the Sea View.

At Cape Traverse, a very pleasant summer resort, is the Landsdowne hotel; in Alberton, the Albion Terrace and Wisner; in Tignish the Railway and Bellevue; in Kensington, Clark's and Commercial; in Montague, McDonald; and in Mount Stewart, Clark's and Manson's.

The following hotels open for the summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant View; at Stanhope, Mutch's and Cliff; at Brackley Point, Shaw's; at Rustico, Sea side; at Malpeque, North Shore; at Tracadie Beach, Acadia; at Alberton, Seaforth; and at Pownal, Florida.

In addition to those already mentioned there are other towns and villages in the Province with hotel accommodation, while many farm houses prepare for the reception of tourists. The rivers and streams teem with trout, the bays with mackerel, while game of every description bounds
