J. W. McLennan has been appointed postmaster at Fredericton Station in place of John Weeks resigned, the appointment dating from the 1st May.

INSTRUCTIONS have been given for the placing of new buoys off Riffeman's Reef and near Indian Rocks. The placing of a buoy of Beach Point and a gas buoy in Hillsboro Bay is also being considered.

A LONDON despatch of yesterday says: Angus B. McLeod, a graduate of McGill University of Montreal, was shot Sunday in Grey's Inn Road E. C., London. The bullet entered below the ear, and has not yet been extracted. McLeod was taken to the Royal Free Hospital, but his condition is not considered dangerous. McLeod's assailant was one of a gang of hooligans. He went to Montreal from Springfield P. E. I. A lengthy account of Mr. McLeod who recently graduated from Presbyterian College, Montreal winning the Morrice Travelling Scholarship of \$500 appeared in yesterday's Guardian.

FRANK MacDonald owner of the tug Alert and Westerspoon was in the city yesterday from Pictou and left in the afternoon for Crapaud to conclude his business in connection with the release of schooner Harry Knowlton which his tug pulled off the shoals. The last of this week Mr. MacDonald will transfer a steam shovel from Pictou to Murray Harbour. This shovel which weighs about 35 tons will be used in ballasting the Murray Harbour Railway. He has also the contract of transferring in lighters to the same place, the cars and locomotives from Georgetown for use on the railway.

THE most noteworthy feature of the opening of Master term of the Supreme Court yesterday was the admission to the P. E. Island bar of Messrs. P. J. Trainor, C. G. Duffy and Joe. S. O'Neill. These three gentlemen are the first in the province who have been admitted as barristers of the Supreme Court with out having practiced one year at the end of their five year term. This in accordance with the act passed by the Legislature allowed such a privilege to all graduates who have made over 75% Messrs Trainor, Duffy and O'Neill made 82%, 84%, 84%, respectively. The Chief Justice yesterday in congratulating the talented young graduates spoke with more than ordinary warmth of the excellent work done by them and the high marks attained, advising them to continue with diligence the pursuit of their studies and thus win still greater success in their honorable profession.

THE block to be erected on Charlotte street by L. E. Prowse and Isaac Greenwell, promises to be about the finest and most imposing on that street. Work on excavating for the foundation is now well advanced, and it is expected that the building will be completed in time for the fall business. The block which will have a uniform and continuous front, will front on Charlott's street 80 feet, extending to the rear a distance of 90 feet, and will be carried up three storeys in addition to a basement of 9 feet. While there will be in reality two buildings, they will have the appearance of only one building. The height will be 45 feet. It will be a brick structure, with a front of pressed brick and Wallace freestone trimmings. The freestone will enter into the coping, windows, doorsills, lintels, sill courses, and column blocks. The footing will be of concrete with stone walls. It will contain three stores on the street floor and will have two rear entrances. The second and third storey will be used in connection with the stores and possibly office purposes.—Sydney Post.
