The Markets

MONTREAL, Que., June 14.—With foreign bids for Canadian goods the local exporters' market today was again very quiet. The demand from United States exporters for continental freight from this port was good and engagements of heavy grain were made at 1 1/2 cent per bushel over the Montreal market today. The domestic market for top grades of Canadian western oats was weaker and prices were reduced one cent per bushel. There was some demand for rough No 2 feed oats and sales were made at 1 1/2 cent per bushel over the July option c. i. f. Montreal and 10,000 bushels of Manitoba No 5 wheat also changed hands. No 2 Canadian Western oats were sold on spot at 63c, No 3 C.W.A.T. 58c and No 1 feed at 56c per bushel. Prices for spring grades flour were well maintained under a fair demand. The winter wheat situation was without any new feature to note. Under a continued good demand from country buyers, the feeling in the mill feed market was steady. There was no change in standard grades of rolled oats and the demand was limited. The feature of the potato trade was the weaker feeling that developed and prices were reduced seven to ten cents per bag. Quebec varieties were quoted at \$2.00 per bag. A fair volume of business was transacted in eggs and prices were unchanged. Fresh extras were quoted at 37c to 38c and firsts at 34c to 35c. Retail receipts were 3228 cases. Extreme dullness marked butter prices unchanged No 1 pasterized 37c per pound. The receipts were 1,271 packages. Tone of the cheese market was firm but the demand was small western No. 1. Retail receipts were 19,340 and 20c per pound and western grades at 19c to 19 1/4 cents per pound.

UNITED STATES IMMIGRATION LAW AMENDED.

To Favor Aliens who served in the Armed Forces of the United States during the World War.

By Act of Congress approved May 27, 1926, special provisions are made for aliens who served in the military or naval forces of the United States at any time after April 5, 1917 and before November 12, 1918, who desire to emigrate to the United States. Briefly the exceptions made in favor of alien veterans are as follows:

1. They are considered nonquota immigrants.
2. They are not subject to the \$5.00 head tax.
3. Immigration visas will issued gratis.

Families of Veterans.

"The unmarried children under 18 years of age, the wife, or the husband of an alien veteran shall, for the purposes of the Immigration Act of 1924, be considered as non-quota immigrants when accompanying or following within 6 months to join him, but shall be subject to all the other provisions of that Act and of the Immigration Laws."

The foregoing provisions of this Act shall not apply to any alien unless the immigration visa is issued to him before the expiration of one year after the enactment of this Act. That is, the privileges under this Act will cease May 26, 1927.

An alien veteran shall, after residing in the United States, be entitled at any time within two years after the enactment of this Act, to naturalization upon the same terms, conditions, and exemptions which would have been accorded to such alien if he had petitioned before the armistice of the Great War, except that such alien shall be required to appear and file his petition in person and to take the prescribed oath of allegiance in open court.

It will be seen from the terms of the Act that an alien veteran, to be entitled to its benefits, is a person, man or woman, who (a) Served with the organized armed forces of the United States for some period between April 5, 1917 and November 12, 1918. (b) Is eligible to American citizenship. (c) Was not discharged or separated from the service under other than honorable conditions.

Proof of Status.

An alien veteran who applies for a nonquota visa under the Act of May 26, 1926, should be in a position to satisfy the consular officer that he comes within the class defined in the Act. The best evidence is the rightful possession of an honorable discharge. In the absence of an honorable discharge, a certificate in lieu of a lost discharge issued by the Adjutant General's Office or the Bureau of Navigation, United States Navy, Washington, D. C., may be accepted.

Any alien veteran who desires further information regarding this Act should communicate with the American Consulate, Charlottetown.

King's College Campaign

ST. JOHN, June 12.—A total of \$10,882 for the University of King's College building-endowment fund was reported by workers in the Saint John-Rochester organization, at their meeting Friday.

In addition to these results from the local workers, several Anglican parishes outside of Saint John, have sent in preliminary partial reports. Fredericton, which is endeavoring to raise \$10,000 for the King's appeal, reported to E. A. Schofield, chairman for New Brunswick, that \$2,345 had been subscribed up to Thursday night, and that the campaign in Fredericton was just getting well under way.

Christ church, of Norton, reports \$171 turned in at the first meeting of their committee, which is seeking to secure \$750, while the Anglican parish at Blackville-Derby reports \$270 raised toward their \$500 objective.

Partial reports were also received from Welsford, showing \$473 raised to date, with more to follow, although their objective has already been more than fifty per cent subscribed. Chatham reports \$620, Christ Church, St. Stephen, \$400, and Woodstock, \$70, raised up to the time of submitting their first partial reports.

The purpose of the campaign is to make it possible for King's College to qualify for the offer made by the Carnegie Corporation of New York, which will give the University \$600,000 contingent upon their friends of King's raising \$400,000.

The total objective of the New Brunswick campaign is \$750,000. The City of Halifax is raising \$225,000, the remainder of Nova Scotia \$75,000, and Prince Edward Island, \$25,000.

Shelburne Built Yacht for Canadian Sportsmen

BOSTON, Mass., June 14.—The palatial new schooner yacht, Blue Dolphin, built and launched recently at Shelburne, N. S., is fitting at the wharf for a salmon fishing expedition to St. Mary's River, carrying a party of Canadian sportsmen styling themselves The Blue Dolphin Company, Limited. The new craft is planned for sporting purposes and designed to carry passengers into any sort of water of any length voyage their fancy dictates. The master will be Captain O. L. Seeley, a Nova Scotian who has sailed out of Gloucester many years but maintains a home in his native province. The Blue Dolphin is 100 feet long with 22.6 ft. beam drawing 13 feet. Her bowsprit is fitted with a "pulpit" for sword fish hunting.
