SHARKEY IMPRESSIVE

The Toronto Globe has the following: Jack Sharkey, according to dispatches from his training quarters at Orangeburg, N.Y., is just as aggressive in his training as he is in his interviews. During the last few days he has been putting plenty of power behind his punches, much to the consternation of his sparring partners, and if he shows the same form when he boxes Primo Carnera in defense of his world's heavyweight championship next Thursday night it is likely to prove a disastrous evening for the gigantic Italian. Pride plays a prominent part in Sharkey's general attitude, and he has been stung, no doubt, by the criticism of the decision which made him champion in his bout with Max Schmeling last year. It is easy to imagine that the former sailor is smarting as a result of the adverse comments, and is determined to show the world in general that he is a worthy champion. The critics may be generous in their comments as to Carnera's ability or they may be right in saying that he has improved greatly since he was trounced by Sharkey two years ago. In any event, he has not shown much in competition to create the impression that he is a much better boxer. Sharkey has grown older in the meantime, but so has the Italian, and even though this is a year of boxing upsets, it is logical that Sharkey should be established as the favorite.

LARGE CROWD EXPECTED AT BIG BATTLE

Boston Gob 7-to-5 Favorite As Battle Nears.

NEW YORK, June 25—Jack Sharkey will defend his heavyweight championship Thursday night against the biggest challenger in the history of the ring, Primo Carnera, who packs 262 pounds on his six feet six and one-half inch frame.

Regarded purely as a "fistic freak" when he first invaded American rings three years ago, Carnera has progressed to the point where his own improvement and a peculiar promotional situation have earned for him a "shot" at the big prize in boxing.

Thanks in part to the impetus given the sport by the recent spectacular duel between Max Baer and Max Schmeling, Madison Square Garden is preparing to welcome a crowd of about 60,000 to its outdoor bowl in Long Island City and predicts receipts of close to \$350,000.

Although Sharkey decisively whipped the giant Italian in 1931, the champion is favored by odds of no better than 7-to-5 this time. Two factors enter into this situation. The Boston saller is nearly 31 years old. Carnera, on the other hand, is a much better fighter than he was two years ago. He still punches without snap but the sheer weight of his arms is enough to wear down the average fighter over 15 rounds.
