PRINCE EDWARD ISLANDER DIES AT AGE OF 102

MONCTON, June 29.—J. Patrick Powell, probably Moncton's oldest citizen, died yesterday in his 102nd year after an illness of only two days. Mr. Powell was a native of Memramcook, was a native of Prince Edward Island and had lived as well, in different parts of the United States, particularly in Philadelphia and Boston.

Until a very short time ago he retained the fullest use of all his faculties and followed the events of the day with greatest interest. He had many interesting reminiscences of the earlier days in the province, particularly with regard to agriculture and the primitive means of transportation when there were not even roads, but mere trails through the forests, on which pack horses were driven.

The funeral was held this morning, Mass being sung at St. Bernard's Roman Catholic Church, with interment in the cemetery in St. Charles road.
