Seek Owner Of Unclaimed Bank Account

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, March 27.—Hakon Andersson, a seaman from Gothenburg, Sweden, was the object of an international search today after an unclaimed bank account now worth \$500 turned up here.

Emil O. J. Danielson, vice consul of Sweden at Boston, joined the search for the seaman who 20 years ago deposited \$218 in an East Boston bank and then turned the bank book over to Anton B. Mortensen, superintendent of the Norwegian seaman's mission here. The account gathered interest and the bank book was discontinued recently.

Mortensen, who left the service of the mission shortly after the incident in Nov., 1914, recalled today Andersson's instructions to "mind the while." Unless Andersson or his heirs are located immediately the funds will be "outlawed" and turned over to the State of Massachusetts.

Drydocking Of Ships In U. S. To Be Probed

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, March 27.—The Dominion has ordered an investigation to determine why two ships of the government merchant marine fleet are being repaired in United States drydocks, Minister of Railways R. J. Manion announced today in the House of Commons. At the same time orders were issued all ships in the future must be drydocked in Canada, he said.

The two ships are the Canadian Highlander and Canadian Britisher. The Minister announced a few days ago it was impossible to obtain drydocks at Halifax and Saint John at appropriate days and the ships went to New York.

The Railway Minister, questioned by Hon. Peter Veniot, former postmaster general, said today his earlier announcement, based on information received from C. F. Fulkerson of the C. N. R., was inaccurate in part. Inquiry was made at the Saint John drydock, he said, but not at Halifax.

To clear the air an investigation of the whole thing had been ordered, he said.

Saint John Police Hold Kidnap Suspects

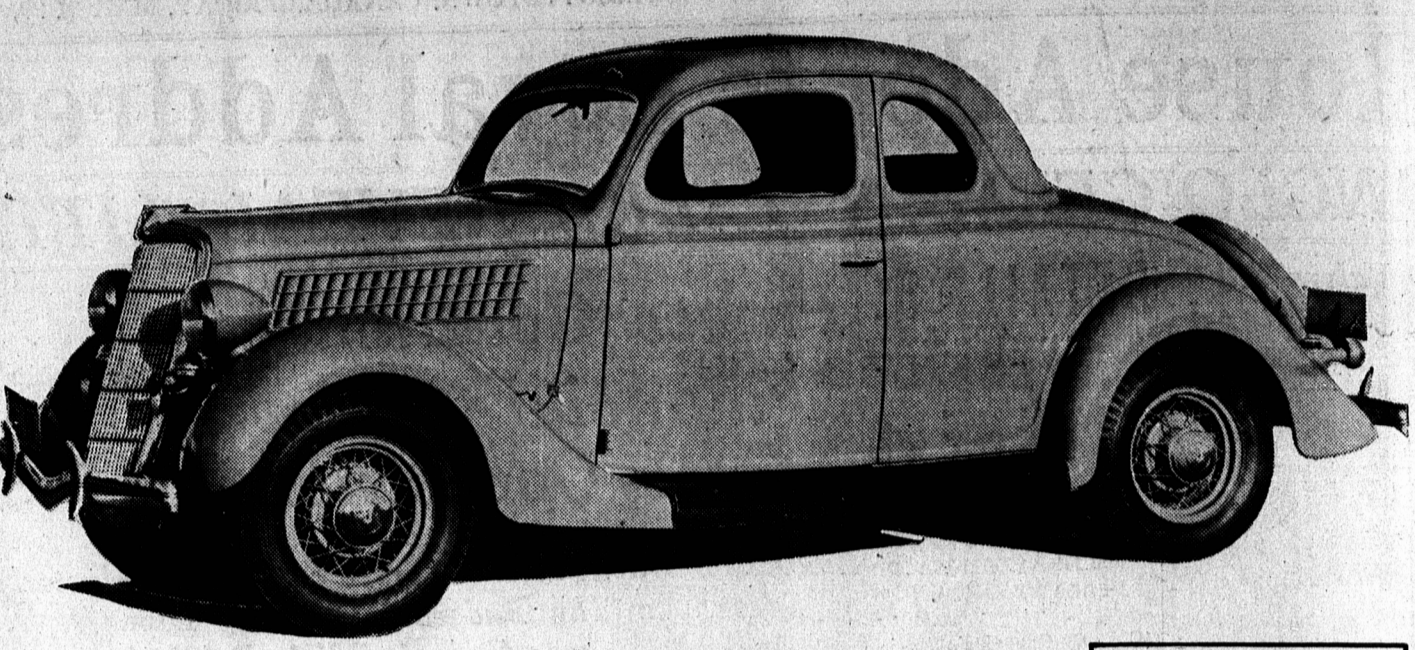

B., March 27.—Royal Canadian Mounted Police here received word tonight that two officers had left Toronto today for Saint John following the arrest here of two men who gave their names as Kenneth and Rand Pearce, suspected of being George and Robert Prince, brothers wanted on charges of armed robbery and kidnapping near Portland, Ont., last October.

Another brother, Albert, and Howard Burbridge are serving sentences in Kingston penitentiary for the same offences, involving the hold up and robbery of a tobacco truck. The kidnapping charging arose from the gang's action in locking the driver and a companion in the truck.

An Ontario provincial police circular bearing pictures of the two wanted men led to the double arrest early today. Police claimed descriptions of the men held tallied with those of the brothers sought. One was arrested in a restaurant and the other at his rooming house.

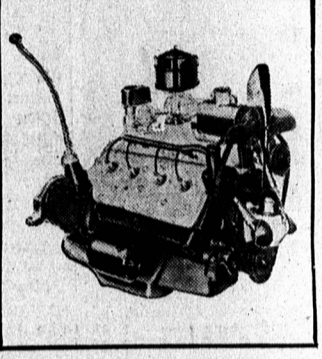

CANCER

The number of deaths reported as being caused by cancer is becoming greater each year. It is becoming increasingly obvious that new methods of treatment must be developed in order to cope with the problem. Activity in the field of cancer research is being increased throughout the world. Research has been made possible through cancer funds which have been contributed, in large measure, by the general public assisted by Governments.

Such funds, however, are not used solely for the purpose of research, but to improve existing methods of treatment, especially in regard to radiotherapy. The resources of the physician, the chemist, the bacteriologist, the pathologist and the physicist and statistician are correlated in an effort to ascertain the cause and develop new methods of treatment. The day is rapidly passing when an individual working alone in his laboratory can make a discovery of major importance.

In this way only can we succeed in controlling this disease, which has taken such an unduly large toll of life.
