LOOKING FOR BUILDING AND FACTORY SITES.

One of the hopeful signs of the time in Charlottetown is the brisk inquiry for good dwelling houses, in which the demand has considerably exceeded the supply. Another is the inquiry from a large manufacturing concern, already noted in The Guardian, for premises in which to establish a new industry here. Should this materialize, as there is good reason to hope it may, it means the incoming of capital from outside the Province to give further employment all the year round to local workers.

Still another hopeful sign is the number of inquiries for building sites for dwellings, half a dozen or more of which have come within The Guardian's knowledge during the past few days. This gives hope of greatly increased activity in the building trade with more employment for skilled labor, and also a considerable increase in the property valuation of the city in the near future. These are all hopeful indications which it is a pleasure to record and we are most hopeful that from this beginning we may have later to take note of expansion and progress in all these lines.

With our greatly improved streets and sidewalks, Charlottetown is becoming yearly a more attractive place of residence. The rate of taxation is moderate compared with many other cities, the water supply is unsurpassed, peace and order prevail by day and night, and no city in Canada has a lower rate of mortality. Here are the precise conditions that make a city attractive as a place for homes.

For new factories there is an unoccupied field, a local market of the most desirable kind, in the most densely populated Province of the Dominion, where the people are well-off, and where there is no local competition. It is easily apparent that these are rare conditions. Any competition must come from outside and the competitor must pay freight charges which would go a long way to assure profit to the local manufacturer.

try in other parts of Canada are awakening to the fact that here is a virgin field which awaits occupation and exploitation. That it has been so long unnoticed has been largely our own fault. No united, systematic effort has been made to interest either capital or industrial skill to take note of us, or to set before them the advantages we have to offer. How this can best be done is a matter for deliberation and earnest counsel. We must wake up and acquaint the outside world with the advantages and possibilities of our Province as an industrial field.

Our city and Province need wider publicity abroad. In this matter, while the local press can do something, we should learn a lesson from our cousins in the Northwest who employ publicity agents at liberal salaries and spend money with a lavish hand in printer's ink. They find, too, that it pays them tenfold their outlay. Here, locally, we need a real estate company also to bring prospective buyers and sellers together. Such an agency might make good money for itself while stimulating activity in the real estate market and building up both city and the Province.

The time has come for a forward movement all along the line, now that we have the Car Ferry in sight and are apparently nearing the end of our transportation disabilities. We want more skilled farmers, say, from the United Kingdom or from Denmark, to set the pace for intensive farming, or to occupy the farms that are vacant or for sale; skilled fishermen to develop our rich and unexploited fisheries. We need to set open every opportunity to our own sons and daughters in order not only to stay the exodus, but to bring back the exiles from abroad, with the good tidings that better days have dawned and a glowing future awaits fair Prince Edward Island. United, persistent and confident efforts along these lines cannot fail to be productive of good results and probably of results that may prove astonishing, if well-directed.

TO CORRESPONDENTS.

We take it as an evidence of the popularity of The Guardian and its wide circulation that we are receiving many more letters for publication than we can possibly use. And we like to get letters. In them we often get valuable facts and opinions with regard to important and timely topics. But most of the letters we receive for publication are far too long, and many of them simply repeat statements and arguments that have been already printed. We are compelled therefore to ask our correspondents to be brief. One hundred, two hundred, or at most three hundred words should be the limit, yet we are constantly receiving letters of one, two and three thousand words in length! Very long letters can rarely be used at all, and when printed it is usually after days of delay. The news of the day must be published, and the Legislative reports make large demands on our space. Short letters on timely topics will always be welcome. There is not much that is new now to be said on the automobile question or church union and we have had many letters on these subjects. Wherefore again we urge our correspondents to be brief. Boil it down. Cut out all needless verbiage and omit what has been already said by yourself or another. If possible keep within the limit of two, or at most three hundred words!

NOTES

It appears that Senator Scott, although he criticised the new subsidy to Prince Edward Island, did not actually record his vote against it. The report telegraphed to some Maritime Province papers and quoted by The Guardian was accountable for the error. Senators Yeo and Prowse spoke well on behalf of the Province, giving due credit where credit is due, and not claiming any undue credit for themselves. We believe this course will be approved by our people generally. But we do not think the Island public will be satisfied with a Car Ferry service of eight or nine months in the year. It ought to give service during every month of the twelve and we hope it will.

There is a wide-spread feeling that if the Earl Grey had not had one of her propellers stripped and not repaired the port of Charlottetown might have been opened weeks ago.
