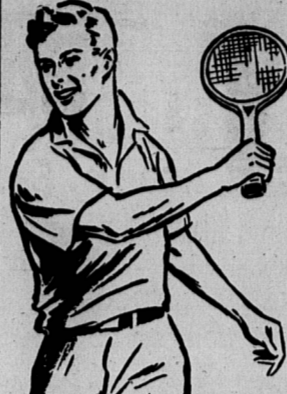

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**ARM ... PERENNIALS**

(Experimental Farms Note)

In the milder sections of the country most perennials can be planted successfully until quite late in fall, but where the winters are severe care should be taken so that planting is finished several weeks before the ground is hard frozen and a mulch of straw or other suitable material applied.

Perennials that have been grown from seed down in spring and transplanted during the summer should be ready to put in their permanent places in September. If the ground is dry water thoroughly so that the soil adheres to the roots when the plants are lifted. If planting in a border, group three to five plants of each variety together leaving ample space so that each plant can develop to its full size.

Iris plants can be divided quite late in September although July and August are generally considered the best time to do this. At the Central Experimental Farm we have found that iris plants generally begin to show signs of falling after three or four years. When the plant should be dug up and the oldest parts of the rhizome discarded. Pieces with several fans of good healthy leaves should be chosen and three or four can be planted about a foot apart in a clump in a large border. In a small border a single division is sometimes sufficient. The soil where they have to go should be well dug and some bone meal added before replanting. The roots should be made firm but the rhizomes should be just at the surface of the soil. A sunny position should be chosen for the tall bordered varieties.

**Manitoba To Cut Civil Service Pay**

WINNIPEG, Aug. 30—A general civil service salary cut of 7 per cent was announced last night by Hon. John Bracken, Premier of Manitoba, just before he left for the east to attend a conference on wheat marketing at Ottawa.

As part of the Manitoba Government's program of economy the new cut, effective September 1, will bring the total salary reductions to 15 per cent for most civil servants and 25 per cent for those in the high salaried classes. The first cut went into effect nearly a year ago.

The latest reduction will affect salaries of cabinet ministers and of employees in services controlled by commissions such as the Manitoba Telephone System.

The Government will discontinue the practice of guaranteeing municipal expenditures and overdrafts and may discontinue the grants now given the Winnipeg Tourist Bureau and the Industrial Development Board of Manitoba. Other economies will be effected by amalgamating Government services wherever possible.

**A New Rubber Source**

(Des Moines, Iowa, Register)

Two and a half years ago, a Soviet employee near the Chinese border noticed the highlanders of a certain region chewing some kind of gum in the American manner. He found that this gum came from a plant, hitherto unknown to scientists, which grew on sunny slopes from 4,000 to 5,000 feet up. Examination showed that the root of this plant contained 40 per cent latex, yielding 95 per cent pure rubber by a process of extraction both simpler and cheaper than that used for the latex of Brazilian and Malayan rubber trees.

This plant, which can be grown in valleys, flowers twice a year and resists frost, though it demands hot sunshine. It has been found so valuable that the Soviet Government plans to complete this year a rubber factory, with a daily capacity of sixty tons and to have 250,000 acres planted in the newly found "towsgis" by the autumn of next year.

Russia, in her future industrial development, stands to make large gains from the exploitation of this new rubber source—if it realizes on all its promises. And if it can be grown in this country, towsgis may also help to solve some of our rubber problems. At least, it might pay some enterprising American to get hold of a few plants and try to cultivate them here.

smaller than they used to do. When this occurs it is time to move and divide them. September is the best season to do this. If it is possible to give them a new bed it is better to do so. If this cannot be done then the plants should be dug up and the old soil removed and new, good soil put in its place. A handful of bonemeal for each plant should be mixed in with the new soil. After digging the plant carefully out of the soil and divide the roots as carefully as possible. Divisions with four or five eyes are the best for an ordinary garden though smaller divisions can be made if a large number of plants are required. Peonies should be planted so that there is two inches of soil above the eye. Too deep planting is one of the causes why peonies fall to bloom.

**Farm Notes**

**EMBARGO AFFECTS PRAIRIES**

With a view to assisting in the control of crown rust of oats and black stem rust of wheat, a ministerial order, effective after September 1st, 1932, prohibits the importation of the European buckthorn and certain species of barberries into the three prairie provinces—Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta—from any of the other provinces of the Dominion. The order further provides that if the European buckthorn and nine named species of barberries are found within the three prairie provinces they shall be exterminated without any claim for compensation.

**SWEET CLOVER ENSILAGE**

"The most suitable stage at which to cut sweet clover for ensilage is when the majority of plants are in full bloom," writes E. S. Hopkins, Dominion Field Husbandman, in his annual report for 1931. He also observes "It is feasible to haul the crop to the silo immediately after cutting or within two or three hours, while the addition of water to sweet clover silage is not to be recommended. As is the case with oats, peas, vetch ensilage sweet clover held in storage in the silo for periods varying from three to nine months does not appear to sustain any damage or lose any of its palatability."

**COW TESTING PROGRESSES**

One of the most important factors in the improvement of dairy cattle and herd management is cow testing. In Ontario, Saskatchewan and British Columbia this work is done under the supervision of provincial Departments of Agriculture, while in the other six provinces it is carried out under the supervision of the Dominion Live Stock Branch. Since 1926 the number of associations entered, have increased from 85 to 320, the number of herds from 1195 to 4061, and the number of cows from 12,142 to 37,772 (for 1931). During the past six years there has been an increase of 16,928 cows completing records for eight months or more, with an average increase in production of 815 pounds of milk and 5.78 pounds of butter fat per cow.
