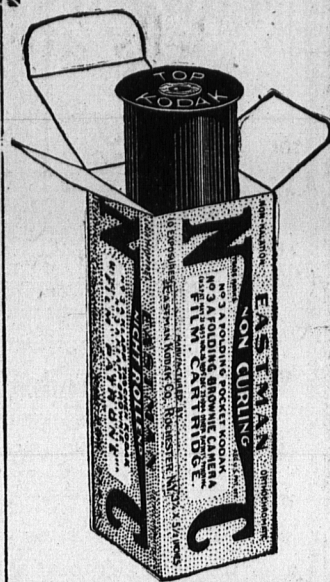

ISLANDER HONORED.—Mr. A. R. McLeod, M. A., son of Rev. Geo. E. McLeod, Toronto, Ont., has just been awarded the Wolston Scholarship by Cains College, Cambridge, worth \$1,200. He also holds a bursary of \$350 and the 1851 Science Research Scholarship of \$1,500 awarded a year ago but which owing to the war he did not take advantage of at time of award. He sailed from New York on the S. S. Paul on Sept. 4th, and will spend the next three years at Cambridge. As the work in Cavendish Laboratory is somewhat interrupted by the war he will either spend the winter in doing government work in connection with the war or enlist for service in the army. Mr. McLeod was born at Covehead, P. E. I., where his father was at one time stationed.

CHARLOTTETOWN EXHIBITION FORECASTS AND FEATURES

The Exhibition this year will receive all the publicity that experience and foresight can command from the Management. For the third time in twenty years the Exhibition will be open to all Canada.

Representative exhibits are confidently looked for from nearly every province. Owing to the fact that the Committee have received a handsome grant from the Dominion Government, they have been enabled to increase the Prize List in Live Stock and Poultry to the extent of 50 per cent., thus making the Prize List in Live Stock fully as large as that of any exhibition in the Maritime Provinces.

At this early stage it is perhaps premature to speculate, but the entries are coming in fully as rapidly as in any former year. The poultry houses within the Exhibition grounds have been completely altered and renovated, thus affording more light and air throughout. It has been arranged to accommodate the most modern coops and in sufficient number to accommodate all the birds that may be brought. The increase in the Prize List should offer greater inducement to breeders and others to bring forward their very best in live stock and poultry sections.

There will be three days' horse racing on the track, which is in fine condition at present. Eight classes will be represented. In this feature also more money is being offered in purses than has ever been offered in previous years on any race track on Prince Edward Island.

Carpenters and workmen are now hard at work getting the stalls, booths and other fixtures arranged and everything will be ready in time for what looks like the biggest exhibition ever held here.

It had been hoped that the Committee might have secured the services of an aviator to give exhibition flights as was done last year, but the difficulty of finding one who was not of foreign nationality has proved a barrier. However this year's show will not suffer for lack of interesting features and exciting events. These will take place in front of the grand stand each day.

The Bicycle High Dive is a daredevil stunt which thrills the crowds at Coney Island and other big resorts, but has never been performed on Prince Edward Island.

The exponent of this hair raising feat is the Great Van Norman, whose exhibition is described as "Death-defying, astounding, and spectacular." From the top of a platform 45 feet high he rides at headlong speed down an incline only two feet wide and 85 feet long. Reaching the end of the incline, which at this point turns slightly upwards, he plunges headlong forward over the handlebars of the bicycle which falls into a net, and dives head foremost into a tank of water placed about forty feet from the end of the inclined platform. This daredevil feat is performed twice daily by the Great Van Norman.

Then there are the three Claire sisters. The daring performances of these sylph like ladies is altogether out of the usual run and leaves the spectator astounded. Suspended only from a wire held by the teeth these artistes go through serpentine dances and other graceful evolutions which lead up to the grand finale which consists in the three whirling round at terrific speed from the ends of the wires in a horizontal position like a human aerial swing. Their act is described as "so daring and different from other aerial performances that the spectator is enthralled with the intrepidity of the performers and the nonchalance with which they execute the most hazardous feats."

Another vaudeville star of the first magnitude is Paul Pedrini the feat equibalist. Pedrini uses his feet with as much skill and dexterity as most people use their hands. His marvelous equilibristic and juggling feats with articles of all sorts and sizes fill the onlooker with amazement. Accompanying Pedrini in his acts is "Thoy, the giant baboon," whose grotesque human capers are productive of roars of laughter. This is claimed to be one of the cleverest acts ever seen on Prince Edward Island.

"The Monarchs of the Wire," the cleverest troupe of lady and gentlemen equilibriste on the wire that has ever

visited the Island are also featured. The members comprise the George Cole Troupe. Their marvellous and sensational work on the steel thread leaves the spectator spellbound carrying various marvels across and other balancing feats on this precarious foothold make up a turn which thrills with its daring and nerve.

Then there are the Lobinas, the "physical enigmas who in an inverted position use their hands as the ordinary acrobat uses his feet." This is an absolutely European novelty. These topsy-turvy marvels go up and down ladders on their hands, walk on long stilts, balance at giddy heights with one hand on one pole, leap from platforms on their hands, and leave the beholder dumb-founded with surprise.

As a comic relief the Eddie Trio will prove a welcome show. Their grotesque pantomime act displays a variety of back-breaking acrobatic and contortion feats. The troupe has also a collection of most laughable stage accessories which further enhances the fun of their really clever performance.

Altogether the attractions provided this year, of which the above are but a few samples, promises to out-class anything ever shown at a Prince Edward Island Exhibition.
