Upswing Continues On N. Y. Market

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 — (AP)—The stock market Saturday stepped out of its widest recovery week in three months with utilities and rails leading a last-minute upswing on expanding volume.
 The list had to contend with considerable profit cashing until the final quarter hour of the short session brought a resumption of bidding. Brokers, as throughout the week, credited demand mainly to growing Wall Street political optimism, earnings, dividends and belief that more of a technical revival was likely.
 Gains of fractions to two or more points were well in the majority at the close.
 The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up 5 of a point at 64.7, largest Saturday upturn since March 16, and for the week registered a net advance of 24 points broadest since the period ended Aug. 2.
 Prominent on the upside of the concluding session were Johns-Manville, ahead 2 1/2 at 127 1/2; American Can 1 1/2 at 85 1/2; North American 1 1/2 at 29; American Water Works 1 1/2 at 17 1/2; American Telephone 1 at 18 1/2; Southern Pacific 1 at 46 1/2; Union Pacific 1 at 125 and Twin City Rapid Transit 1 1/2 at 16 on the first dividend since 1931.
 In front were Electric Power & Light, Public Service of N. J., N. Y. Central, Northern Pacific, Baltimore & Ohio, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, U. S. Rubber, Woolworth, Douglas Aircraft, Kennecott and Standard Oil (N.J.). Declines were posted for Santa Fe, Goodrich, Western Union "A", Du Pont and American Smelting.

Churchill Urges Full Facts Of Armaments Be Obtained

(By The Canadian Press)
 LONDON, Oct. 31 — Winston Churchill urged today that the United Nations ascertain the full facts of world armaments by "an interchange of actual military facts supported by adequate reciprocal inspection" among all countries.
 Warren Austin, head of the United States delegation to the United Nations, Wednesday endorsed disarmament proposals made by Foreign Minister Molotov of Russia but added that "effective safeguards by way of inspection and other means" should be incorporated into any world disarmament plan.
 United Nations investigation of "world armaments would be a great step forward in itself and may lead the way to others" he said.
 In a statement generally regarded as a further reply to the "instigator-of-a-new-war" accusation made against him earlier this week by Generalissimo Stalin, the former Prime Minister said:
 "We are told that one of the great evils from which we suffer is international suspicion. There is a very good remedy for suspicion. It is the full disclosure of the facts and that simple sovereign remedy, I hope, will be applied to the world situation by the United Nations Organization now meeting in the United States, and what I called war talk swept away by an interchange of actual military facts supported by adequate reciprocal inspection on terms of honorable equality between all the powers, great and small, which are involved."
 Earlier today the London Daily Mail said in a dispatch from New York that Britain would accept the Russian disarmament proposal, but would insist that a "fool-proof" scheme of inspection be agreed. The newspaper said Prime Minister Attlee had been consulted by the British U. N. delegation and acceptance would be announced "as soon as possible."

Pickling Time

Mixed pickle spice, nutmeg and cinnamon give a delicious flavour milder than the high seasoning usual in tropical countries. Here is a recipe for a fruit pickle of chutney type recommended by the agriculture department consumer section:
 Fruit Tumale: eight large or 12 medium ripe tomatoes (three pounds); three peaches (1 1-2 cups, chopped); three pears (1 1-2 cups, chopped); three medium onions (1 1-2 cups, chopped); one cup of celery, chopped; one small hot red pepper (two tablespoons chopped); or six small dried chili peppers; two tablespoons whole mixed pickling spice, 1 1-2 cups of brown sugar; two teaspoons of salt; one cup of vinegar.
 Blanch, peel and chop tomatoes and peaches. Peel, core and chop pears and apples. Peel and chop celery. Remove stem and seeds from pepper and cut finely. The spices (including dried chili peppers if used) loosely in a cheese-cloth bag. Add spice bag, sugar and salt to vinegar, bring to boiling point and add other ingredients. Cook uncovered until thickened—about 45 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove spice bag; pack pickles in clean hot jars and seal. Yield is about four pints.

New Twists in Old Legend

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 —Recent news stories of a "gazelle boy" said to have sped over the plains of Trans-Jordan at 80 miles an hour, add the latest chapter—with two new twists—to a fable as old as human imagination.
 It is the tale of boys or girls adopted and reared by wolves, bears, apes, leopards, sheep or pigs and even in one legend by seagulls.
 The story of the gazelle boy who could out-run the fastest racehorse was quickly punctured. But such stories have popped up recurrently in many different countries from primitive to modern times and are deeply rooted in mythology.
 The possibility, extremely dim, that it could happen, accounts for the popularity and toughness of the creator of a Department of the fable says Dr. John Eric Hill, Mammology, American Museum of Natural History.
 "The new tidings in the gazelle boy story are that gazelles were picked, apparently for the first time as the "foster parents" and that the boy reputed to have a gazelle's speed after living with them were allowed.
 "The 'gazelle boy', captured in Trans-Jordan and put in hospital, a patient boy who had wandered turned out to be just a mentalist."
TABLE MATS FINALLY GROWING UP
 Have you been annoyed when setting a table, trying to arrange a goblet, a dinner plate, a bread and butter plate, and the necessary silver, on a 12-by-18-inch mat? asks Gladys Miller.
 "Well, take a long, deep breath—you have not been alone. And the designers have heard your sighs and cries. They arrived at their conclusion in a very serious way.
