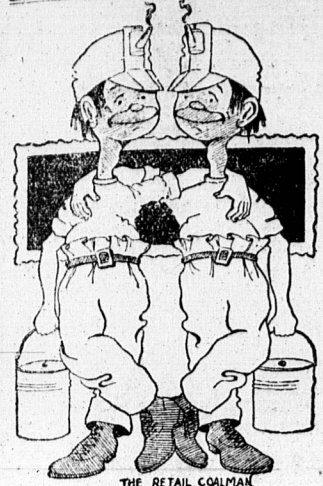

NO JOB AFTER ALL FOR FRASERVILLE HANGMAN.

OTTAWA, March 4—The cabinet to-day decided to commute to life imprisonment the death sentence was passed upon Jules Plourde, who was to have been executed at Fraserville next Friday.  
The case involves an anomaly in that two brothers were convicted on the same evidence. One, however, was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to ten years, while the other was adjudged guilty of murder and sentenced to death. There was some provocation and evidence as to the killing being in self defense and the trial judge is understood to have favored commutation.

### WHAT ITALY HAS LOST IN MEN SINCE BEGINNING OF WAR

ROME, March 4—In order to prevent a misunderstanding, the war department has issued a statement of the casualties on the Italian side in the Turco-Italian war, from the beginning of the conflict to March 2nd. According to this statement 37 officers and 499 men have been killed and one officer and 323 men are missing. While it is believed that the missing men have certainly been killed, there is no official record to this effect.

### PARRSBORO TO BORROW \$12,000 TO CREATE A LAKE.

PARRSBORO, March 4—A meeting of the ratepayers of Parrsboro was held this evening to consider the proposal to create an artificial lake by building an aboiteau across the river near the Iron bridge. Major Jeffers presided, and a resolution authorizing the town council to apply to the legislature for power to borrow \$12,000 for building the proposed aboiteau. After an animated discussion the resolution was adopted by a vote of 102 to 29. The proposed dam is one of the measures to which the new council was pledged and its enthusiastic endorsement by the ratepayers is regarded as an indication that the town is walking to an appreciation of its natural advantages, and is determined to make the most of them.

Thomas gave a helpful address on temperance, and a program of songs, pianoforte selections was provided. On Sunday evening, after song service, Rev. Mr. Lawson conducted the service, and delivered an excellent address to the large number of sailors present. The hearty singing was greatly enjoyed.—St. John Exe. (Rev. A serious accident was narrowly averted on George Street, Charlottetown, yesterday, when the span of young horses driven by Dr. Haszard accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Judge Haszard, became frightened and bolted. Luckily Dr. Haszard was at their heads and although the horses circled three times he bravely and pluckily held on and when help came quieted the panic stricken horses. Although the sleigh was somewhat broken no one was hurt as Mrs. Haszard jumped out of the sleigh safely onto the sidewalk.

The nationalities of the cotton and woolen mill work of Massachusetts, as evidenced by the following statement from the latest official returns prepared by Charles D. Pidgin, the statistician, is of interest. The distribution by native and foreign born is—native, 48,598; foreign, 79,660. But this does not tell the whole story. The 79,660 foreign born represent more than 62 per cent of all employed, but 116,101, or more than 90 per cent, have foreign fathers, and consequently, foreign names. The 116,101, having foreign fathers, when distributed by countries indicate the cosmopolitan character of the American working men and women in the leading textile industries. 33,821 Canadians are employed in the cotton and woolen mills exclusive of 173 from Prince Edward Island, 525 from Nova Scotia and 389 from New Brunswick. There are also 2,800 from Scotland, 530 Scandinavians, 2,508 Italians, 4661 Poles, 2,418 Russians, 6746 Portuguese, 7,136 Austrians, and 4718 Germans. The large majority are from England and Ireland, the latter being represented by 26,418 and the former by 17,927.

The St. John's Mill, Evening Herald says the following of the Starbano, a steamer which visited Charlottetown last year, which arrived there a few days ago. The steamer Stephano, Captain Clarke, four days from New York, arrived at 9:30 last night, after a very boisterous trip of four days from New York direct. She left there at four a.m. Wednesday last and met strong winds with tremendous seas all the time. After 24 hours at sea, Captain A. Kean, who went up to superintend the erection of her beams and other preparations for the seal fishery, had a narrow escape from being swept overboard. He was on the shelter deck when a huge wave hoarded her and when receding took the captain to the side and almost overboard. One of his feet went through the rail when he caught himself. It was as close a call as he ever had, because had he gone over the side he could not have been rescued. Later in the evening one of the sailors had a peculiar experience. He was tying down the ventilators when a sea struck him and landed him on the deck above.
