## SOVIET FORCES QUIT ISLANDS

### Action Temporarily Relieves Russo-Japanese Tension.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)  
**TOKYO, July 4**—Complete evacuation of Soviet land and naval forces from disputed islands in the Amur River was reported in dispatches reaching Tokyo today, ending five days of tension between Soviet Russia and Japan.  
Headquarters of Japan's Manchurian army at Hsinking reported Russia had withdrawn all her troops and river gunboats from the immediate vicinity of Sennui and Bolshoi Islands, where Russian and Japanese forces clashed Wednesday with numerous Russian casualties.  
The Russians began efforts to salvage two of their gunboats, one of which was sunk by the other beached and damaged by Japanese-Manchoukuo artillery Wednesday.  
Japanese authorities here and in Hsinking asserted the Russian evacuation of the islands, about 75 miles southeast of Blagoveshensk, provided only temporary appeasement of a situation in which continued friction is to be expected.  
The dispute over the Amur boundary and possession of the islands—which Japan asserts belong to her protectorate, Manchoukuo—is no nearer a solution. Japanese leaders said further incidents along the 3,000-mile boundary between Manchoukuo and Soviet Siberia were inevitable.

## Austrian Wins Scull Classic

**WINDLEY-ON-THAMES**, England, July 4—Another of Canada's scullers for the coveted Diamond Sculls ended in failure at the Royal Henley Regatta Saturday when John Coulson, representing the Argonaut Rowing Club of Toronto, was defeated by seven lengths by J. Hasenohr of Austria.  
The Canadian hit a boom when leading just after the start and lost seven or eight seconds, but Coulson's trainer said he did not think the Toronto oarsman could have won anyway against the powerful, smooth strokes of the Austrian.

main arterial road".  
He uttered an emphatic reminder that the British Government can not remain indifferent "where British interests are concerned on the land or sea frontiers of Spain or the trade routes that pass by her".  
Observers interpreted that as a reference to the danger of any power, especially Italy, attempting to cut the Mediterranean highway to India and the east.  
The foreign secretary declared that Britain had not and would not modify her time-honored principle that the Mediterranean is a "main arterial road", not merely a British shortcut to the Orient.  
Eden declared Britain has the support of both parties in Spain in her efforts to maintain the integrity of that country.

## CHURCH-STATE CONFLICT NEARS FINAL STAGE

(By The Canadian Press)  
**BERLIN, July 4**—A Catholic archbishop told his congregation today that "the final battle is approaching" in church-state conflict, and a Protestant congregation avowed support of their arrested pastor.  
Michael Cardinal Von Faulhaber, Archbishop of Munich, cited the arrest last month of a Jesuit priest on charges of criticizing the Government as evidence that "the fight for annihilation of the Catholic Church has entered a new phase".  
He asserted that "the final battle is approaching" and that "we don't hear any more about Bolshevism as public enemy No. 1—it's only a name for such now" (Catholics are in dispute with the Reich over the right to direct education of Catholic youth, contending that the Reich-Vatican Concordat has been violated on this point).  
Rev. Martin Niemoller's Protestant Confessional Synod congregation crowded his Dahlem Church to hear a substitute pastor defend his integrity and patriotism.  
Their petition for submission to the Ministry of Justice declared that the arrested pastor never had revolted against the state but fought always for maintenance of the Christian faith. He was jailed last Thursday on a charge of "making false statements and inciting to disobedience in state institutions".

## Offer Of Federal Appropriation Of \$4,000 Available — Communication From Transport Minister Received.

An informal meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held on Saturday to deliver a communication received by Mayor Robinson from Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Transport, in which the minister stated that his department would cooperate with Summerside in assisting the Council Board to enlarge and improve their airport. The department would contribute one fourth of the cost of any such expenditures that would be incurred, and that an immediate appropriation of \$4,000 is available for Summerside for air development.  
The minister further stated that he was sending a competent engineer to look over the situation and discuss with the Mayor and Council what alterations and improvements would be necessary to make the airport suitable for commercial planes and the larger type of passenger service. This would bring Summerside in line with the larger aerodromes on the main-land. Summerside has already spent upwards of \$7,000 on the development of its airport which has brought considerable profits to the exchequer and the Councilors favour a further development, especially now that they are assured of a grant from the Dominion Government.  
The opinion was expressed that Summerside would make a very good auxiliary base for Transatlantic liners on account of the absence of fog on Prince Edward Island.  
The engineer would also look into the requirements for the proposed seaplane base at Summerside and look over the situation at the Marine Wharf.  
The whole matter of improvements to the airport was laid over until the arrival of the engineer. A motion was passed to convey by letter the sincere thanks of the Council to Hon. Mr. Howe for his consideration of their needs in connection with the airports.

## CRITICAL OF ITALY AND GERMANY

**LISBON, July 4**—Indications of displeasure in Portugal, traditionally a ally of Great Britain since the Napoleonic wars—with the Italo-Italian diplomatic policy in the Spanish civil war, were seen today, following a speech by Jorge Botho Moniz, director of the Portuguese foreign office and supporter of the Spanish insurrection cause.  
Moniz said Italo-German intervention on the side of the insurgents would do more harm than good to General Francisco Franco's cause. It would gravely compromise Franco's international policy, he asserted.  
Moniz declared Germany and Italy did not want a insurgent Spain to establish any new friendships and most of all wanted to remove Franco from the sphere of influence of France.  
In Moniz's opinion recognition of the belligerent status of the insurgent, obtained by direct negotiations with Great Britain, would considerably ameliorate the British policy regarding the insurgent cause and would tend to re-establish Franco's international policy in Britain and consequently France.

## ESCAPES ASSASSINATION

**LISBON, July 4**—(OP)—Premier Antonio de Oliveira Salazar escaped assassination in an apparent attempt on his life.  
A bomb which exploded in a sewer under the sidewalk as he was leaving his automobile to attend mass in the private chapel in a home of a friend, shattered windows 100 yards away but only covered the Premier with dust.  
There were no casualties. A large stretch of pavement was torn up.  
Persons who ran to the spot found the Premier and his secretary calmly dusting their suits.

Valera in the position of having to rely on Labor support to continue in office.  
Labor's progress surprised everyone and gave indications that Labor spokesmen might have been correct in their pre-voting claims the party would hold the balance of power in the next Dal (parliament).  
Holding but eight seats in the old Dal that had 153 members, the group now appears to be in a position to dictate terms.  
Anticipating a stalemate, political commentators already forecast that de Valera may within six months declare a further election and appeal for a complete majority.  
The constitution, voted on in a referendum with the parliamentary election, continued to make surprisingly slow progress with latest available returns tonight showing 370,028 for and 309,916 against.  
An abnormal total of nearly 45,000 spoiled ballots ranging from 757 in Wicklow to 5,578 in Sligo was considered to indicate electoral indifference to the constitution.
