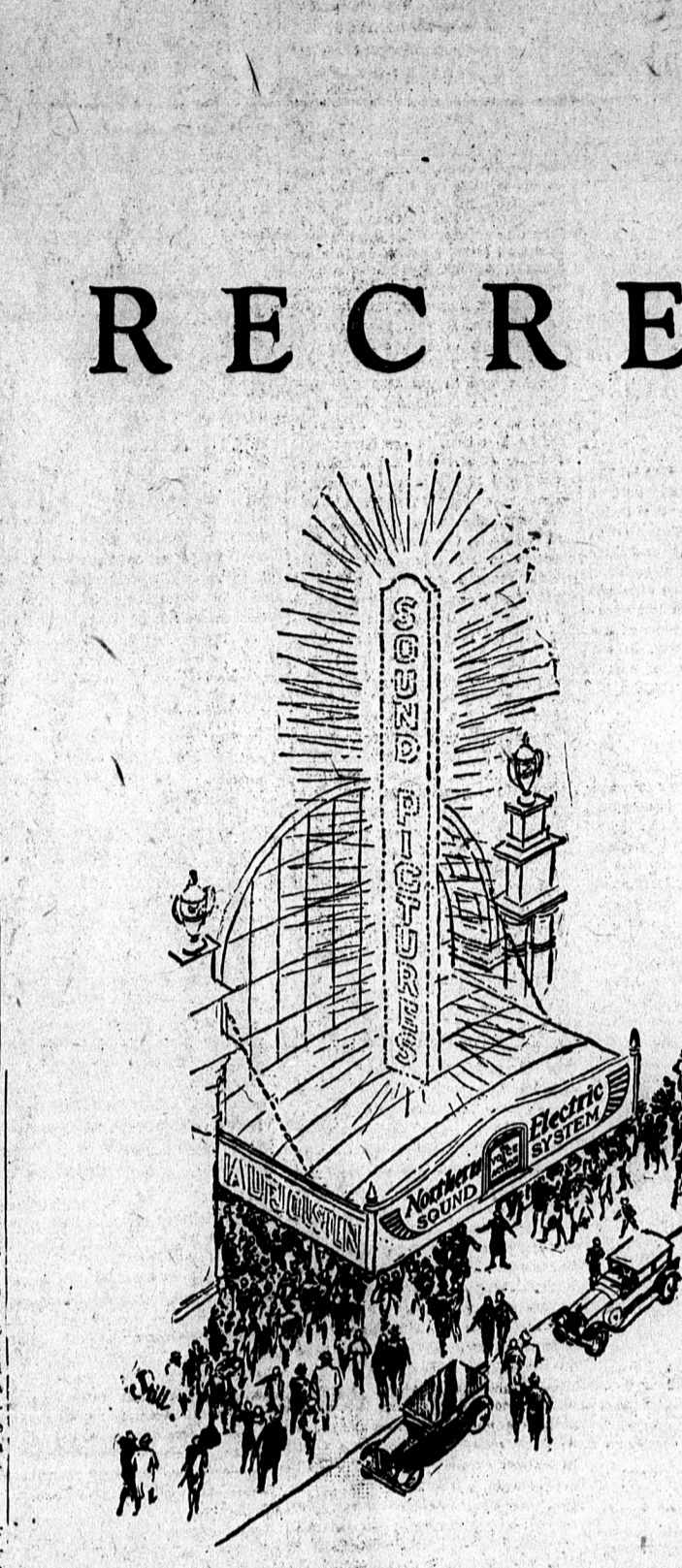
Mrs. Boyd Livingston, Clyde River spent a few days recently in Kingston, a guest of her brother Duncan and Mrs. Marshall.
