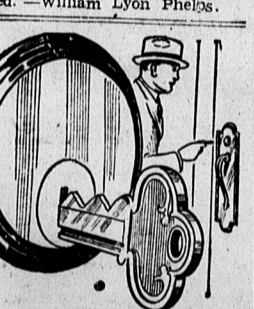

DIESEL ENGINE MAKES RECORD

LONDON, Oct. 29.—A small car with a Diesel engine as its power unit has recently been driven from London to Brighton and back, a distance of 112 miles, on something less than two gallons of fuel oil. As this oil is marketed at 10c per gallon the cost in fuel alone worked out at 18c for the trip.

This is an outstanding performance, first as indicating that the Diesel engine, essentially a bulky and heavy affair has at last been reduced in weight and dimensions to car limits, and further as showing that in this small compass and in the varying circumstances set up by road and traffic conditions, it has become a practicable power unit.

EUROPE WILL DEFEND RIGHTS OF ANIMALS

PARIS, Oct. 30.—(By the Canadian Press)—An International Committee for the Protection of Animals has been formed here on the initiative of M. Louis Lepine, legal adviser to the Society for the Protection of Animals. The committee takes the stand that animals should not be legally regarded as inanimate objects, protected only by sentiment on the part of their owners, but as living creatures having legally defined rights on the same basis as man himself. Every month the decrees, verdicts and other matters bearing on the rights of animals are to be published. Among recent rulings are the following: In Belgium, it is forbidden to blind song birds, and rabbit hutches must be sufficiently high for the rabbit to stand on its hind feet. In Spain, the land of bull fights, punishment may be meted out to those who incite animals to fight, who throw stones at dogs and cats and who the objects to them for amusement, who pluck live poultry. The Republic of Lebanon prohibits the utilisation of female animals for strenuous labor while feeding their young.

RHODESIA EGGS FOR ENGLAND

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 30.—(By the Canadian Press)—The first consignment of eggs from Southern Rhodesia, comprising 368 cases, each of 30 dozens, was offered for sale on the London market recently, and met with favorable reception, wholesale prices beginning at 14 shillings per 120 eggs. An official of Empire Dairies, Limited, the dairy importing agency of the Overseas Farmers Co-operative Federation, stated that the eggs had arrived in a satisfactory condition, considering their long journey in cold storage. He had found them to be well graded and attractively packed and in every essential they compare with eggs from the Union of South Africa. There is stated to be every likelihood of regular autumn supplies from the colony.
