PHOTOGRAPHS SHOWN

Cpl. Lionel Strong, R.C.M.P., said he took three photographs last Wednesday morning of the scene where accident occurred. (Photographs were shown to the witness.) Witness said the tire tracks went 43 feet on left side of road near turn. 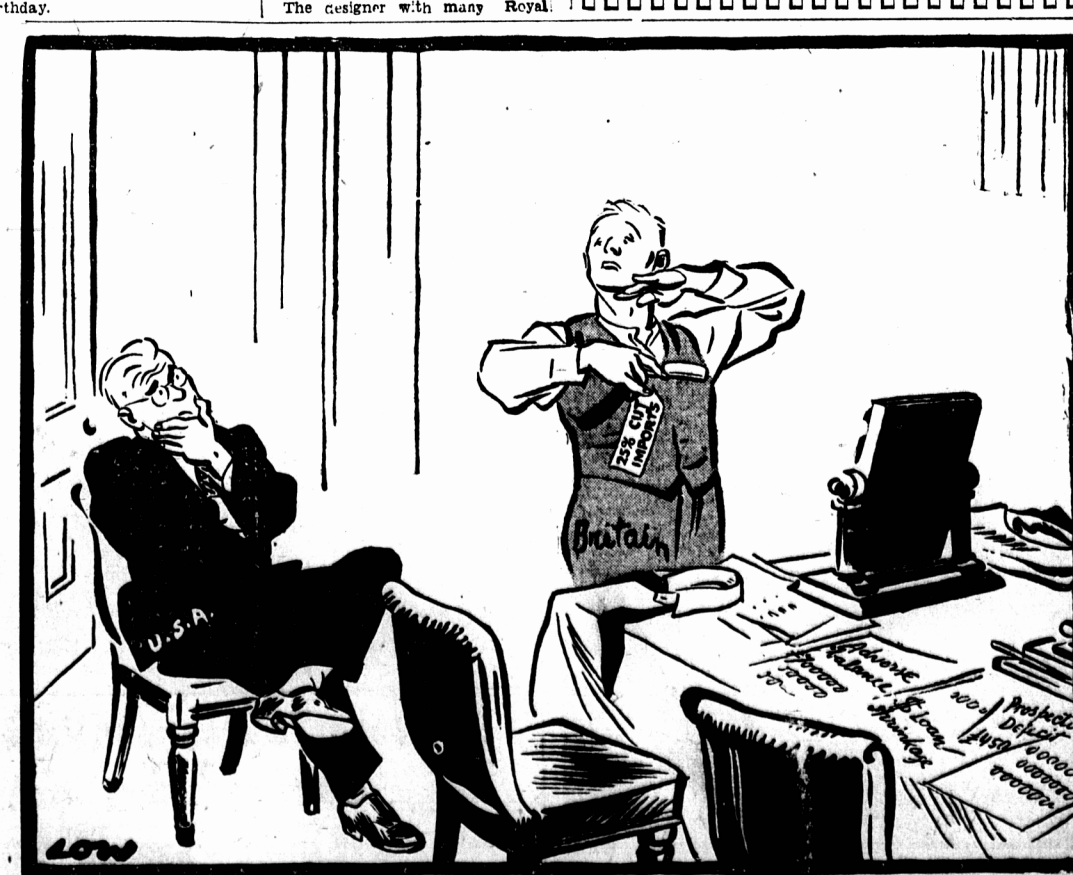
