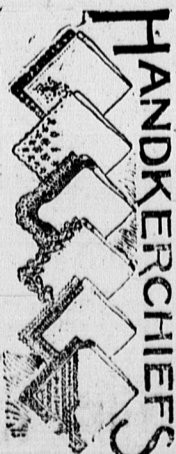

Finlay McKenzie, of Flat River has gone to spend the winter with his son Hector, who owns a large orange plantation in Los Angeles, California. He will visit his son, Dr. David McKenzie in New York, en route.

W. C. Collett of Boston, Grand Master of Oddfellows, writing a friend in this City last week, says that he has been very busy during the week, having travelled over half of the State, visited three lodges, initiated two others and attended the annual banquet of Massachusetts, making six nights that he spoke to large gatherings and saw one hundred and five persons made Oddfellows.

D. P. Leonard, representing Chesbro Bros., 1 Fulton Fish Market, New York, is in the City. Mr. Leonard reports large shipments of smelts and eels from this province already this season. If fish are graded well, carefully and cleanly packed and arrive on the market early in the week and in good condition they are sure to realize good prices the stock of frozen fish this year is so far less than for many years. The warm weather in the early autumn greatly reduced the value of green smelts, but with the cold weather recently prices will continue to greatly improve.

The market was well attended yesterday owing to the good roads, and much produce was moving, butter sold at twenty-five and twenty-six cents and pork at seven and seven and three quarters cents per lb., geese at one dollar to one twenty-five each, chickens at fifty to seventy-five and ducks at twenty-five to one dollar a pair, eggs at twenty-eight to thirty cents per doz., loose hay at forty-five to fifty and loose straw at twenty-five to thirty per cent; pressed hay at \$8.50 to nine and pressed straw at six dollars per ton; white oats at thirty-eight and thirty-nine and black oats at forty to forty-one, potatoes at twenty to twenty-two and turnips at fourteen and fifteen cents per bush.

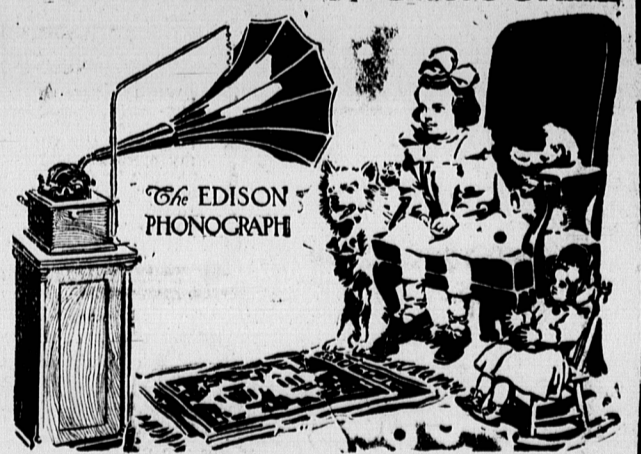
