The SS Halifax is expected to arrive this morning about seven o'clock. A LARGE quantity of freight is being handled on the railway at present.

The congregational meeting to have been held in Zion Church yesterday evening has been postponed for two weeks.

THE time for the mail express to leave Summerside changed yesterday and that train arrived in the city in the early evening bringing the New Brunswick mail.

A NEW Presbyterian church, to cost \$4,000, is in course of erection at Rossland, B. C., under the pastorate of Rev. D. McGandier. Mr. Gandier is a brother of Rev. Gandier, Halifax, and Dr. Gandier of Pictou, and labored as a catechist during the summer of 1895 in Lunenburg Co.

AN Ottawa despatch says the new Government steamer now being constructed at Scotland for service between P. E. Island and the mainland, to replace the Stanley will cost \$185,000. She will be provided with strong protected stem for breaking into the ice, and her rudder will also be protected by steel ice cutter. Sir Louis Davies has not yet selected a name for the steamer, but probably she may be called the "Minto" after Canada's next Governor-General.

THE "Loyal Crusaders" had a right royal time last evening. The meeting was opened in due form and two volunteers were enlisted. The address of Rev. Mr. Bryan is highly spoken of. The Last Message Home.

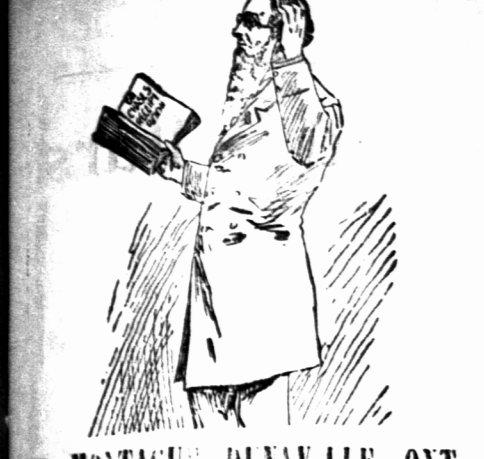
(Pioneer.) The following is a copy of the last letter written by Alfred C. McWilliams to his mother:—

SALEM, Mass., Oct. 6th, 1898. DEAR MOTHER,—I now sit down to let you know how I am getting along. Well, dear mother, I am well in spirit and mind and a bit afraid to see God. Mother, always remember that I am with Jesus when you think of me. Remember that God wanted me or He would not have called me to Him in heaven. And now, dear mother, you will know when this reaches you that I shall have passed away; not dead, but passed away. Dear mother, we will not be parted long I shall wait and watch for you on the other side. Mother, so p and think, I will be with God. What a glorious thing that will be to be with God.
