NOVA SCOTIA WILL JOIN.

We printed the other day the statement of the Attorney General of New Brunswick that the Ottawa Government had informed Premier Tweedie by telegram from Hon. A. G. Blair to the effect that the federal authorities gave consent for a reference to the Supreme Court of the question of representation of that Province in the Federal Parliament.

The other day in the Legislature at Halifax, E. M. McDonald, one of the members of the Legislature for Pictou, asked the Government "in view of the statement made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier on Friday they would join the other Maritime Provinces in submitting the question to the Supreme Court of Canada for settlement?"

In reply to this question Attorney General Longley stated that "the Government would not urge that the representation be increased contrary to the constitution. His own opinion was that the view taken by the Federal authorities was the correct one. Still, if it was decided to submit the matter to the courts the Government of Nova Scotia would join in the reference."

THE BOND-HAY TREATY.

It is pointed out that the Bond-Hay treaty of reciprocity between the United States and Newfoundland is precisely the same, with a slight addition, as the Bond-Blaine treaty of some twelve years ago, the addition being a stipulation that if Newfoundland should hereafter grant any more favorable commercial terms to any other country the United States must be treated with equal favor.

It may be admitted that one object which was present to the minds of the Washington statesmen who negotiated the two treaties was the profitable extension of American trade. And it may be also admitted that such extension might also prove profitable to Newfoundland.

We could not annex Newfoundland—that is, such action on our part would arouse the protests of a most determined character both from Canada and Great Britain. But by the methods which Mr. Blaine proposed we should soon make the people of Newfoundland so entirely dependent upon us that our influence over them would be almost equivalent to that which we could hope to possess if we annexed their island.

There is something in this which affords food for reflection among the people of Newfoundland, as well as the people of Great Britain and Canada. Are the people of the Ancient Colony quite willing to be

made "so entirely dependent upon the United States that the influence of the Republic over them would be equivalent to annexation?"
