She advises two members joining in a subscription as a good way of obtaining our official magazine and keeping in touch with doings of the League throughout Canada. This report would be very incomplete without mention of the great work done by our Social Service Committee. These ladies meet every week at the City Hospital and sew, either making over old garments which they have collected or making up and mending articles for the use of the needy. What a blessing work of mercy—to clothe the needy. In all 628 articles of clothing were made ready for distribution, where they were most needed. Besides these works, school books have been supplied in some cases and 119 Catholic books in connection with the Social Service Department and literature sent to the Sanatorium. Thanks are due to St. Zita's Club for a donation towards this work.

The convener reports her committee happy to have been successful in Social Service work and urges the new committee to carry on to the best of their ability. The 1934 quota of \$200 to Social Service at the hospital has been paid and \$50 on the quota for 1935. Two of our members gave card parties in their homes and paid in \$14 towards this work. In this connection we report with regret that the St. Zita's Club was not re-organized this year, owing to the fact that we could not obtain suitable quarters for a meeting place for the girls.

Dominion Action Is Unlikely

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 2—Exercise of constitutional power by the Dominion to disallow provincial statutes was very unlikely in the case of Ontario Government power legislation so far as could be learned today. Federal Government approval of provincial statutes has become very much a matter of form, although power to disallow is contained in the British North America Act.

Each year the Dominion Government passes an order-in-council accepting the operation of new provincial statutes and in recent years any statutes excepted from such orders have been of a minor nature. The disallowance in the memory of one minister who discussed the matter today was the case of a provincial statute passed too hastily and found to be in conflict with existing statutes. It was disallowed at the request of the province concerned.

The minister said regulations that will govern oyster fishing in the rivers "are not at the moment receiving particular consideration because of the question of health involved."

Steamships And Merchant Marine Report

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 2—Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, showed an increase of \$52,763 in gross revenues during 1934, as compared with the preceding year, according to the annual report tabled in the House of Commons today by Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals. Operating expenses during the same period increased by \$151,444 or 43.8 per cent, as against the increase of 16.69 per cent in gross revenues. The operating deficit in 1934 was reduced to \$96,678, as against \$497,997 in 1933, a betterment of \$401,319. After providing for bond interest, amortization of discount, depreciation on vessels and interest due the government, the total deficit for 1934 was \$1,178,619 as compared with \$1,544,073 for 1933.

Improvement Noted In Coal Industry

By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 2—General improvement in Nova Scotia's great coal industry is shown in Minister of Mines Michael Dwyer's report on mines for 1934, tabled in the Provincial Legislature today. Production during the fiscal year ending last Sept. 30 increased by close to 2,000,000 tons over the previous year, the report shows; sales even more than output; employment picked up by more than 400 men, and working time in the mines jumped 818,000 man-days.

Nine Executed In Russia

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MOSCOW, April 2—Nine robbers and killers were executed by shooting today here and at Leningrad. The condemned included two motormen who robbed women street car conductors. The executions were carried out swiftly after the convictions were obtained, as a part of the nation's anti-crime drive. One man executed had slain a guard who intervened while he was stealing sausages and cheese from a restaurant in the park of culture and rest.
