Air Force To Release 46,000 In Two Months

OTTAWA, Aug. 29 (CP) - Air Minister Gibson announced today that R. C. A. F. release centres had been asked to double their output and work seven days a week to release 46,000 personnel in the next two months.

The release centres, previously geared to demobilize at the rate of 10,000 a month. New release centres have been opened at Dartmouth and Moncton for Pacific Force personnel and one at Boundary Bay, B.C., for personnel of operations training units at which training has ceased following the end of the war with Japan. Col. Gibson said.

One thing is certain: "Demobilization is proceeding as rapidly as possible with justice to the individual and avoidance of undue hardship. It is emphasized that the rights and entitlements of each individual accruing from service in the R. C. A. F. must be fully documented and recorded. This is a protection to the individual."

Fine War Records Of C. N. Steamships

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 29 - During nearly six years of war vessels owned or operated by the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships sailed more than 4,500,000 miles in enemy submarine-infested waters of the Atlantic and the Pacific, R. B. Teakle, general manager of the company, stated in a statement issued here today. All of the ships were in war service either as fighting vessels or as transport ships, munitions, persons on war business and food stuffs to soldiers and civilians of the Allied nations.

As a single group of ships the C.N. fleet is perhaps unequalled by any other Canadian vessels. These boats alone made 221 voyages totalling nearly one million miles.

Thanks Civilian Reporting Officers For Navy Minister

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Aug. 29 - Appreciation of the highly important, though heretofore unpublished services rendered by a group of civilians in this and other eastern provinces has been expressed by Navy Minister Rattenbury, who was announced recently by C.M.R. Nelson Rattenbury, R.D., R.C.N.V.R. naval control service officer here.

These men, chiefly collectors of customs and excise but including a few postal officials, were appointed early in the war as "naval reporting officers" and it was their duty to report promptly the arrivals and departures of all ships, regardless of size, so that naval operations headquarters would have full information on shipping in coastal waters.

Trained to naval coding, they sent all reports by coded messages and many of them became so efficient in their duties that they were able to undertake such work as sending secret messages and advised masters regarding routes.
