'DEADLY LIQUEUR' HER FET TIPPLE.

London's Fashionable Woman Said to Display Increasing Fondness for It.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—Fashionable women's clubs in the West End are very much exercised just now over a subject that one of the newspapers has labelled "The Deadly Liqueur." It all started from a statement in the London World that the habit among women of indulging in what are commonly called 'cordials' is growing at a rapid rate.

Idleness is alleged by the World to be the predisposing cause of a growing indulgence of young married women, especially of the upper classes, in alcoholic drinks. Coffee and liqueurs figure at suppers after the play and at luncheon parties, however simply planned. The girl in her first season nowadays, says this journal, thus drinks her benedictine or creme de menthe perhaps three times daily. The young married woman takes her whiskey and sarsaparilla water as a matter of course, whereas her grandmother would have consumed spirits, corn papuli, with many apologies.

In answer to this the secretary of one of the largest women's clubs declares emphatically that in her own experience among 1,100 members there is no sign of excessive liquor drinking and that it would be considered the height of bad form for any lady to order a liqueur at any time other than at luncheon or dinner.

A correspondent of one of the London newspapers has interviewed a number of wine merchants who agree that a great deal more liquor is sold now than three years ago. Mr. Nutt, manager of the Carlton Hotel, however, told me yesterday that, in his experience, the consumption of chartreuse, benedictine and creme de menthe has remained in the same proportion for fifteen years.

"It is ridiculous to speak of women drinking more liqueur," he said. "There has been no change. The proportion of women who take liqueur is quite small, for in a party of five or six you will seldom find more than one or two taking a liqueur after their coffee."

The truth of the statement that women are in the habit of drinking whiskey and soda in the women's clubs, and that it is a growing practice is not denied. It is ascribed however, to the advice of West End physicians, who recommend this form of alcoholic stimulant instead of the cheap French wines previously drunk by women.
