ROCKY POINT WHARF—Work on the Rocky Point Wharf ended for this season yesterday for the first part of the contract completed and the other part, second part requiring further work when construction is resumed next May. The first part of the contract involved the driving of 79 piles and the placing of 2500 yards of stone. Ninety piles have been driven on the dock face of the dry pier and the contractor, Mr. E. M. Phillips reports that one month's work next spring will finish the job.

Y.M.C.A. BOYS' WORK COMMITTEE ORGANIZED—Under the chairmanship of Gordon Avarad a Y.M.C.A. standing committee on Boys' Work has been organized. This committee will deal with the existing and future program of the National Research Laboratories, said preliminary investigations on quick-butter machines are being made here at the request of the National Dairy Council.

The report also dealt with a German process for cold pasteurization of milk with ultraviolet light and a mechanical cheese-making process.

In Niagara Falls, Ont., Dr. J. A. Pearce, an N.R.C. member, said yesterday the machines might revolutionize the Canadian butter-making industry. But many problems must be overcome to develop quick-butter production in Canada.

Mr. Cook said there is proof both machines had manufactured butter that met German standards but which would not be approved in Canada. Butter-makers here were not permitted to manufacture butter with a 20 per cent water content.

The composition of the butter from both machines is: water, 20 per cent; non-fat solids, 1.5-2 per cent; and butter fat, 78-79 per cent.

No provision is made on either machine for adding salt as most of the German domestic butter is not salted. All of the operations observed used sweet cream although it was stated that ripened cream could also be used with (one) machine.

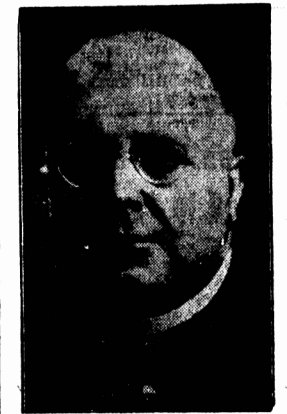
The production of butter to meet Canadian standards of moisture and fat content and domestic salt requirements with these machines would demand some modifications in the processes employed, if not in the machines themselves.

One of the German processes—Alfa—had a design capacity of 550 pounds an hour and required about 120 square feet of floor space.

The other process—Fritz—made butter which appeared to have a lower density than the ordinary product.

INDIA WOULD LIFT NEWSPRINT CONTROL NEW DELHI, Nov. 19 — (CP) — The Newspaper Advisory Committee has recommended that the government lift controls on newspaper by March 31, 1947. Newspapers, particularly the smaller ones, should organize themselves in such a way that there would be no need for government control of distribution of newspaper beyond that date. It was also agreed that the possibilities of manufacturing newsprint in India should be investigated within the course of the next year.
