**EDUCATIONAL EDITOR HERE.**—Miss Pat Lauber, Connecticut, editor of Scholastic magazine is visiting the Province, a guest at the Lennox. She has visited most of the other Provinces, and is now completing her acquaintance with Canada by including Prince Edward Island.

**CITY POLICE COURT.**—A case of "non support" was brought before the Sundry Magistrate yesterday and having agreed on a settlement the case was dismissed. A second case, under the Public Health Act, was adjourned for one week.

**CROP REPORT.**—The Bank of Montreal's crop report on the Maritimes, as at June 10, says: "Spring operations have been seriously retarded by cold weather and excessive rain. Some seeding and planting have been completed on high lands, but in low-lying districts the ground is too wet to be worked. The season is from two to five weeks later than in a normal year. Potato planting in New Brunswick is nearly completed, but in Prince Edward Island only 10/20th of the crop has been planted owing to bad weather. Hay and pasture lands are in satisfactory condition and a good crop of hay is expected. The set of early apples is good, but the bloom of later varieties was retarded by cold weather and the outcome cannot yet be determined. Spraying had to be halted and this may cause some difficulty in controlling insects and fungus pests."

**CHEESE PRODUCERS MEET.**—The second meeting of the P. E. I. Cheese Producers Association was held in the Dairy Superintendent's office on Wednesday, June 17. The purpose of the organization is to deal with problems, as they arise, in the cheese industry and to co-operate with the P.E.I. Dairymen's Association in all its activities.

**New Scholarships At Dalhousie**

HALIFAX, June 20 —(CP)—Establishment of five new entrance scholarships in the Faculty of Medicine, available to students registering for the next term, was announced today by Dalhousie University.

The scholarships, each valued at \$500, will be available to students of outstanding merit from the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland.

University authorities said the awards will be made on a regional basis—one to Cape Breton Island, two to the Nova Scotia mainland, one to New Brunswick, and one to either Prince Edward Island or Newfoundland.

**C.N.R. Revenue**

MONTREAL, June 20 —(CP)—An increase of \$916,000 was reported today in the net revenue for May of the Canadian National Railways all-inclusive system at \$4,304,000 as against \$3,388,000 in the corresponding month of last year.

Operating revenues displayed an increase of \$7,770,000 while operating expenses rose \$6,854,000. Cumulative net revenues for the five months of 1947 showed an increase of \$1,591,000 at \$13,559,000 while operating revenues expanded \$20,295,000. Expenses grew at a faster pace and were up \$21,886,000.

**Communists May Revive Comintern**

EDMONTON, Alta., June 20 —(CP)—Tim Buck, national leader of the Labor-Progressive Party, said in an interview here today Communists throughout the world may re-establish their international organization. Some time ago Premier Stalin of Russia announced dissolution of the Comintern. "We may form the international organization again," Mr. Buck said. "Communism is the result of world conditions and Communists are the manifestation of a world revolution now taking place—and the revolution is going very well, I might add."

**THE KIRK PULPIT**

Preaching last evening, the Minister, the Rev'd. T. H. B. Somers, in the fourth of a series of sermons on "The Meaning of Protestantism" said: But it was not only into full participation in the experience of worship that the Reformers drew the laity. They also drew the laity into full participation in the administration of the Church in all its functions. They demolished the wide cleavage between the laity and the clergy. They denied that the clergy were endowed with special powers, which set them apart as alone fit to decide upon all matters of belief and policy in connection with the Church. They returned to the New Testament policy whereby all men endowed with the Grace of Christ were authorized to hold positions of trusted leadership in the Church.

The individual congregations of Protestant Churches hold title to the property of their own Church. The people in the individual Protestant Church elect their own duly constituted lay representatives, who hold and administer their property for them.

In matters of belief the laymen and the clergy work and plan and decide together. In the Presbyterian Church, the Elders, who with the Minister constitute the Kirk Session, the ruling body in the Congregation, are ordained to their Office and although the ordination of the Elder and the ordination of the Minister are not the same in degree, they are the same in kind. The Elder is ordained to rule, the Minister in his ordination is vested with authority to rule, to teach and to administer the Sacraments in the Church of God. The function of the lay elder, while administrative, is in no sense ministerial.

Here you see a further evidence of the principle re-established from the New Testament by the Reformers, destroying forever the artificial superior and inferior strata of the clergy and the laity, and establishing them on a common level, all one in Christ Jesus.

The Protestant Church is the reflection of a tremendous act of faith, faith in the Grace of the Living God, and faith in the God-given capacities of the common man to respond to that Grace and within the limitations of his human nature, to discern and carry out the Will of God. Protestantism is the demonstration of the truth of St. Paul's words when he said, "God hath dealt to every man the measure of Faith."
