Just at present, the job is in an interesting stage, and the spectator is amazed of the quantity of lumber which has been put up in order that the roof may be placed over the new construction.

The Farming World, and Canadian Farm and Home, commenting on the recent exhibition in this Province says: Great improvements were noticeable in the grounds. Large new cattle barns has been erected, and the old, opened sheds closed in, making it much more comfortable for the stock. This exhibition is now well housed and the management are to be congratulated upon being so well equipped for the agricultural show. In the main building which was nicely decorated with bunting, evergreens and maple leaves, there was placed a grand show of the products of the farm, garden, orchard, dairy, and the exhibits of the schools which have taken up the new idea in education in manual training and nature study. The grains, roots and fruits were the equal of anything to be seen in Canada. The apples and pears were a strong argument in favor of Prince Edward Island as a fruit-producing country. Fruit there was from the far-famed Annapolis Valley, and some of which was bigger and better colored than that grown on the Island on account of their longer season. But Island fruit in plates, as well as in boxes and barrels for export, left little to be desired.
