Commission Will Resume Work In Ottawa

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 3.—The commission investigating the Department of Customs and Excise will resume its work in Ottawa on November 15th. It was learned here today on good authority. The commission which now consists of three judges, will probably be in Ottawa for several days and will then proceed direct to British Columbia if the present plans are carried out. It was said, Hon. N. W. Rowell, K. C., chief counsel for the commission is at present in Ottawa examining records of the Department of Customs.

Regular Meeting of P. E. Island Presbytery

The regular quarterly meeting of the P. E. Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada was held in the Heartz Memorial Hall, Charlottetown on Tuesday, November 2. The meeting opened at 11:30 a. m. with the Moderator, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd in the chair. After the regular devotional period led by Rev. George Ayers, a few words of welcome were expressed by the Moderator to the visiting clergymen and to those meeting with us for the first time. He also expressed regret and sympathy for the members of Presbytery suffering from ill health since last meeting together.

The attendance of representatives was exceptionally good, a large number answering the roll call. As the meeting opened at 11:30 a. m. at 12:30 when the minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted the court adjourned to meet again at 1:30 p. m. As the Moderator had been called away for a time, the afternoon session opened with Rev. H. Pierce in the chair. The meeting being constituted by prayer the first matter of business considered was a call extended to Rev. J. R. Millar of Alberton from New Richmond, P. Q. After due consideration on the part of the Presbytery and an expression of regret for the absence of Rev. J. R. Millar, a vote of promise for the congregation of Alberton, the request of New Richmond was granted. With the best wishes of his fellow presbyters Rev. Mr. Millar leaves shortly for his new charge. Information was to hand that Rev. Mr. Weir of Wallace, N. S. could be procured to fill the vacancy and the following motion was carried unanimously: Resolved that Rev. Mr. Weir be appointed to Alberton for the next year if satisfactory arrangements can be made with the Cumberland Presbytery.

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THE QUALITY OF THE STATUS WITHIN THE EMPIRE

Committee of Premiers Fail to Agree on Question—Hertzog's Claim Has Raised Thorny Problem for the Imperial Conference.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—Premier J. B. Hertzog's claim for international status within the Empire is raising a thorny problem for the Premier's committee of the Imperial conference on inter-imperial relations. Day by day the committee is meeting and throwing ideas into a common melting pot. It is surrounding its proceedings with the most profound secrecy. But so far, it is understood, the committee has not reached any solution of its difficulties.

Premier Hertzog, while disclaiming any idea of separation from the Empire, is still pressing his idea of international recognition. He takes the ground, it is understood, that while there has been much talk of the Empire as a community of equal nations, it is not so in actuality, and will be such until there has been some form of international recognition.

Hon. W. A. Black Heads Trust Co.

An audience with His Holiness the Pope had been arranged for the prime minister and Mrs. Taschereau for the 25th instant.

Adjournment by Fifteenth is Suggested

Efforts Being Made to Speed up Work of Conference—Premiers Invited to Visit Dublin.

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Nov. 3.—Another three weeks work in all probability lies ahead of the Imperial Conference. Efforts are being made to speed up adjournment by November 15 is suggested but this is doubtful. Premier Mackenzie King is making arrangements to be back in Ottawa for the opening of parliament in early December. He expects to spend a few days in France before sailing for Canada.

Financial Position Of National Railways (Canadian Press) WENNING, Man., Nov. 3.—Hon. Robert Rogers, former Conservative member of the Federal House, addressed a meeting of the Conservative Club here last night. Mr. Rogers went exhaustively into the financial position of the Canadian government-owned railways, maintaining that the "indisputable truth" was that the situation as to liability was "worse by many millions than four years ago." Mr. Rogers charged that in presenting the annual railway report, the Minister of Railways had included all the earnings of all the railways comprising the national system but when he dealt with capital liability the minister had given to parliament only those figures which attach to the Canadian Northern, the Grand Trunk, and the Grand Trunk Pacific, with the result, he claimed that the truth was concealed and the people deceived.
