

"DRIED-UP OLD AGE" VERY WET SAYS SCIENCE

Seventy-five Per Cent. of Body Made Up of Water Which Increases With Years

"Water constitutes about one-third of the body weight," writes Dr. Eugene Lyman Fisk in his famous book, "Health Building and Life Extension." "A great deal of the water that surrounds us and that of us is under the guise of solids," he says. "Seventy-five to eighty per cent. of the body is made up of water—brain tissue excepted. That brains are mostly water we can readily believe when we consider other people; but not so readily as applied to ourselves. It is a curious fact that old people are wetter than young people. . . . The water content of the body is 81.2 to 84.8 per cent. in old age as compared with 75 to 80 per cent. in earlier life. So among other traditions for the discard, we must include that of the dried-up old man!"

ROTARY CLUB—"An Agricultural Need in Our Province," was the subject of an address given before the Rotary Club yesterday by Mr. Frank Tinney, Assistant Supt. to the Experimental Station of Charlottetown. Mr. Tinney in the course of his address referred to the lack of opportunity afforded our young people, our young men particularly, of obtaining a satisfactory training in this province along the lines of agriculture. He did not intend to discuss the question of teachers' salaries, but he would like to know why in this province, where agricultural pursuits occupy the immediate attention of approximately 80 per cent of our people, it is not possible to obtain home training in that should be the all important subject. Mr. Tinney gave a harrowing description of the ruinous condition of some farm settlements and of the state of the roads, even the main highways. These run-down farms in the Province can be brought back to profitable production, but it will take a little time and a great deal of patience. It can be done more easily now than it could have been twenty years ago, by the aid of the seed potato industry, for this industry in average years, offers a ready cash crop that helps to keep things going while building up the soil fertility. But to accomplish this our young men must have training in the fundamentals of a system of permanent agriculture, and should be led to appreciate the dignity of farming as a profession. The speaker made an eloquent appeal for the adoption in the public schools of a strong policy of agricultural education. Mr. J. A. Clark, the chairman, in commenting on the address, said that there should be agricultural high schools in this province. The guests present yesterday were Rotarian A. P. McConnell of Boston, Thomas Olsen, Toronto, J. E. Love, Calgary, H. R. Bridgeman, Quebec, and C. S. Segge, St. John. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan on behalf of the Red Cross Society, expressed appreciation of the work done by the Rotarians on a number of occasions on behalf of crippled children. Recently the Rotarians assisted in getting patients for the preparation of serum for infantile paralysis. President J. A. MacMillan said that when a number of Rotarians were waited on for this purpose every man consented although in some cases it involved a drive of forty miles. He also announced that it has been arranged that on Friday Rotarians will give an outing to seventy or eighty children of school age, who are pupils at the two Orphanages. The cars will meet on the square at 2.30 in the afternoon, and after giving the children an hour's drive, will return with them to the Strand Theatre, where Mr. Gallagher has kindly arranged to show a number of films.

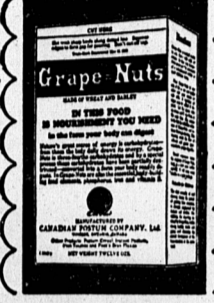
