Cobb Drives "Railton" To New Record Of 350 M.P.H.; Eyston Will Race Today

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah, Sept. 15.—(AP)—John R. Cobb of England ascended the world throne of speed on land today when he drove his sleek little "Railton" to a new record on the 350-mile-a-minute class for only a day.

Cobb's compatriot, Captain George E. T. Eyston, whose record of 345.9 miles an hour was hiked 4.7 miles per hour immediately scheduled a record attempt tomorrow with his seven-ton "Thunderbolt."

Will Hang Around

Threatening to extend the unprecedented automobile duel as long as weather and finances permit, Cobb said he would "hang around a few days," obviously to try to re-top any new mark Eyston might set.

Cobb, a ruddy-faced, 290-pounder who races for fun, used only 4 1/2 miles of the solid white salt track on both north and south runs to reach the measured mile. "Railton" only half the weight of "Thunderbolt" shot forward like a comet.

On the northbound run, the silver and black racer, as streamlined as a tear-drop, went through the mile in 10.19 seconds or 353.29 miles an hour.

Cobb's return run, necessary to re-establish the record, was slightly slower. "Railton" did the mile in 10.37 seconds at 347.16 miles an hour.

Eyston's kilometre record was 345.21 miles an hour, Cobb shattered it by averaging 350.07 miles an hour.

The jovial broker said he had a really terrific feeling of speed. The car just went faster and faster until it seemed it couldn't stand any more speed. My vision was blurred. I could hardly see anything at all.

"The wind screamed around the cupola madly. All was noise of the motors and the wind."

He said Reid Railton, designer, "built the car to do 350 miles an hour" and "he deserves the credit. I only drove the car."

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Upsets Mark Play In U. S. Golf Tourney

OAKMONT COUNTRY CLUB, Oakmont, Pa., Sept. 15.—The greatest series of form reversals in the 42-year-history of the United States amateur golf championship today swept four comparative unknowns into the semi-finals and knocked out Canada's Joe Threlk, little Joe Thompson of Hamilton, Ont. and defending champion Johnny Goodman of Omaha.

Of the crack international field that last Monday started the long drive-pitch-and-putt marathon, there were left for the semi-finals tomorrow:—

Edwin C. Kingsley, 23-year-old of Mapleton, N. J., who was eliminated from the Canadian amateur tourney this year in the semi-finals by the present champion, Ted Adams.

Willie Turness, 23-year-old young son of the golfing Turnesses of New York, who failed to qualify last year.

Richard D. Chapman, 27, of Greenville, Conn., making his first start in the big classic, who licked Goodman, 2 and 1.

B. Patrick Abbot, 25-year-old former United States public links champion from Alameda, Calif., a movie extra also making his debut in top-notch amateur play.

Johnny Fischer of Cincinnati who won the laurels in 1936, was ousted by Turness in 20 holes.

Abbot whipped into the semi-finals by knocking Jimmy Fraser, Atlantic City, out in a third round match, 2 up, and then eliminated the last invader, Hamilton's Joe Thompson, "Giant Killer," 1 up in 20-holes. It was Thompson's third straight extra-hole match.

Kingsley reached the select quarter with a 4 and 3 win over Wilfred Crossley of Dedham, this morning, and a quarter final 5 and 3 edge over Melvin (Chick) Harbert of Battle Creek, Mich.

Bucs Set Slugging Record In Defeating Giants 7-2; Tigers Beat Yankees 6-4

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—Pittsburgh Pirates set a season slugging record for the big leagues today by walloping the Giants 7-2 to climb three full games in front of the National League baseball pennant race.

The defeat dropped the Giants into fourth place, half a game back of Cincinnati Reds. The Reds and Chicago Cubs, in second place, both were idle today.

The Bucs wheeled out their big guns right from the start today, continued swinging from their heels all the way, and accounted for six of the seven runs on homers. Paul Waner whacked two into the right field stands. Brother Lloyd, Pep Young and Johnny Rizzo connected for one each. It was the 19th of the year for Rizzo.

AMERICAN LEAGUE
NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—The Tigers topped New York Yankees 6-4 in the opener of their current series in Detroit today, but the defeat didn't stop the world's champions from taking another step toward their third straight American League baseball pennant.

As a result of the doubleheader split for Boston's second-place Red Sox, in Cleveland, the Yankees now have only three wins to set up the flag.

A pinch-triple by Roy Cullenbine at the start of the seventh inning sparked the Tigers to a two-run rally to take the game from the Yankees. They added an unnecessary run in the eighth on Billy Rogell's triple and Mark Christman's single.

At St. Louis, the Browns stumbled deeper into the cellar with a 6-4 loss to Washington's Senators.

Four Broome errors contributed to the defeat. Former Brownie Sam West's big bat drove in the Senator's marginal runs with a hard single after pitcher Howard Mills had walked in the tying run in the fourth. Beat Bell fumbled the throw for his second error and the fourth run of the inning crossed the plate.

Split Doubleheader

Cleveland and Boston split by identical scores of 3-2, the Tribe taking the first game and the Sox the second.

The Indians drove pitcher Jack Wilson from the mound in the first inning of the opener, scoring all three of their runs with only one out.

Johnny Humphries pitched the ninth inning of the second game after Bob Feller was lifted in the eighth for a pinch hitter, and was charged with the loss.

Humphries walked Higgins, first man to face him, and Higgins made the rounds on Chapman's single and Doerr's fly for the winning run.

At Chicago, the White Sox and Philadelphia Athletics divided a doubleheader, the Sox winning the first game 5-4 and the Mackmen the second 1-0.

Although Bob Johnson had a perfect day at bat with four singles and Bill Werber hit his 11th homer of the season with two on for the Athletics in the first game their late spurt failed to overcome an early Sox lead.

George Caster muffed the Chicago attack in the nightcap, allowing but four hits.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 15.—Two-listed John Bromwich of Australia, Gene Mako of Los Angeles played fine singles today and moved into adjoining brackets in the semi-final round of the men's United States singles tennis championships.

Bromwich turned back Joe Hunt, United States Davis Cup spare, 6-1, 9-11, 6-3, 6-4, in a 2 1/2 hour battle which saw Hunt reeling at the finish. Mako slugged Gilbert A. Hunt, Jr., of Washington, D. C., 7-5, 1-6, 8-6, 6-0.

But it was the woman who really furnished the show. Dorothy May Gray, the sunshine girl from Santa Monica, Calif., drubbed veteran Mme. Rene Mathieu of France, 6-3, 3-6, 6-0 and Nancy Wynne, fourth-seeded invader from Australia, put out England's Margot Lumb, 6-4, 5-7, 6-1.

Miss Wynne had been expected to win—many make her the favorite for the women's title—and Miss Lumb was entitled to nothing but praise for her admirable battle. Less can be said for the two Hunts; Joe, fifth in the United States rankings and third on the second day, and Gil, whose rapier-like volleying beat Bobby Riggs on Monday.

The California Hunt finished in wobbly shape against Bromwich. He held his side, he rubbed his forearm and he limped on his left leg.

Gil Hunt, in contrast, just didn't seem to care. A heady player and beautiful volleyer at his best, he showed only streaks of his top form against Mako.

Complete Maroon Line Is Purchased By Black Hawks; Canadiens Bolster Team

MONTREAL, Sept. 15.—(CP)—Montreal Canadiens, who lost their only Maritime player last month when a Joffre Deslats was traded to Chicago Black Hawks for Louis Trudel, gained another today by buying young Des Smith of Maroons.

Smith, like Deslats a former Charlottetown and Saint John amateur, came to the Habits as Maroons began dismantling what they once called Montreal's "big red machine" of the National Hockey League.

A brief announcement told the sale to Canadiens of Stew Evans and Cy Wentworth, veteran defencemen; Jimmy Ward, Bob Gracie and Herbie Cain, and Smith a youngster they brought up last season in an effort to bolster Hockey League.

In Chicago, the management of the Black Hawks announced purchase of a complete forward line from the Maroons—breaking up after 14 years' experience, during which they twice won the Stanley Cup. Russ Bilco, centre, will move to Chicago, flanked by Baldy Northcott at left wing and Earl Robinson at right wing.

Details of the negotiations were not disclosed. Officials declined to mention the amount of money involved.

"We're not telling that, not just now at any rate," said Tommy Gorman, former Maroon Manager and still chief of the Forum where Canadiens will play approximately 24 of their scheduled games.

"It involved quite a pile of dough," revealed Cecil Hart, Canadiens manager, who decided he had made sufficient revelations for the day—except that Canadiens will have "just about the speediest team in the League" this season.

May Not Be Retained

Whether all six former Maroons will be retained is a matter that will be decided after the Frenchmen start training Oct. 22.

However, six new men had been added to the roster so there must have been tentative places for them at least. Hart admitted that.

"I don't say we have to keep all these fellows," said Hart. "We

Glace Bay banged out nine hits off Calhoun and Fraser who relieved the former in the seventh.

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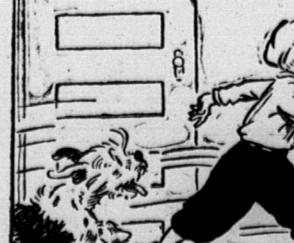
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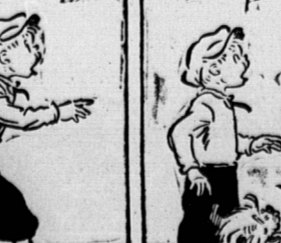
