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Daily War Survey

The German high command is employing in Belgium the tactics which brought speedy success in Poland but so far has failed to create the disorganization of the defence which came speedily in Poland.

A feature of these tactics is the rapid push of mechanized columns towards definite objectives within the territory of the opposing side. These pushes are launched with a degree of violence which involves considerable risk of confusion and lack coordinated action by the whole force.

The French command has already altered its method of fighting in order to meet the German tactics. The French announcement that open warfare will be waged instead of a warfare of position means the French will use methods similar to the Germans.

It is still much too soon to appraise how effective the enemy tactics may be against Allied defences but while there are a few instances reported of enemy columns penetrating far into the Allied lines the columns appear in all cases to have been drive back or immobilized in a pocket.

The latter result is almost as satisfactory as a definite repulse for it means the column is unable to deploy or spread out after penetrating the defence lines and so cause serious trouble to the defenders. There are also reports of columns suffering because of inability to get ammunition up to their new positions. This is one of the results of air operations. Allied planes have had some success in bombing transport trucks, smashing up roads and railways and destroying bridges behind the advancing Germans.

LONDON, May 15—(CP)—Gunfire from the battle raging in Belgium and France shook houses at Deal on the Southeast Coast of England tonight.

Similar distant rumblings were heard earlier in the day.
The tremblings were described as so violent that they resembled an earthquake.
Each rumbling was heard approaching like a mighty wind, first murmuring in the distance and increasing to crescendo violence as the windows and doors rattled.
All day long rumblings were heard and felt along the coast. They brought back memories of the war a generation ago when fighting raged in Flanders across the Channel—some 80 miles eastward.
