SUMMERSIDE, March 24 (Special).—The annual meeting of the committee of management of the Summerside Public Library was held in the Library rooms last night. The librarian's report showed that some 2,000 books were given out during the year. No new books were ordered last year. The Financial Secretary's report showed a balance of \$25.75 at end of year.
