

# Britain Takes Steps To Retain Naval Security

## Will Keep Over-age Cruisers In Active Service Until International Situation Clears.

(C.P.-Havas, By Guardian's Special Wire)

LONDON, Dec. 17.—Great Britain has decided to retain five over-age cruisers in active service because of the increasingly dangerous international situation, Sir Samuel Hoare, First Lord of the Admiralty, told the House of Commons today.

His statement to the House followed an announcement last night that Britain would construct in 1937 to total 200,000 tons, five times as much as in 1932.

The United States and Japan already have been informed that Britain does not consider the present an opportune time "to scrap serviceable vessels" in accordance with article XXI of the London Naval Treaty of 1930, the Admiralty chief declared.

"The United States government has indicated that if His Majesty's government decided to have recourse to article XXI of the London Naval Treaty to retain these vessels on the grounds that the requirements of our naval security necessitate that action no objection will be raised by them," Sir Samuel said.

"No final answer has as yet been received from the Japanese government but we have every reason to believe their reply also will be favorable."

The five ships which would have been scrapped under the terms of the London Treaty are the 4,290-ton cruisers Ceres and Cardiff built in 1917 and the 4,180-ton cruisers Calcutta, Cayuse, and Cardigan, constructed in the same year.

Sir Samuel's statement in the House was made in reply to a question from Winston Churchill, who asked whether the Admiralty head was in a position to make a statement as to retention in service of the cruisers due to be scrapped under treaty arrangements before the end of the year.

During a debate in the House of Lords tonight it was indicated that European powers were paying close

# UNVEIL PLAQUE IN MEMORY OF RAILWAY HEAD

## Ceremonies Held All Across Dominion Last Night — Mr. John A. Collings Unveils Local Tablet.

Striking tribute to the memory of the late Sir Henry Thornton, K. B. E., former chairman and president of the Canadian National Railway and to the esteem with which he was held by railway employees, was paid at ceremonies which took place all across Canada last night.

Memorial plaques, erected in honor of Sir Henry by employees of the system were simultaneously unveiled in fifteen centres. In Charlottetown the unveiling of the bronze plaque was made by Mr. John A. Collings, retired railway employee. The beautiful bronze tablet is located in the main waiting room.

The general function was the unveiling at the Union Station at Ottawa. The ceremonies which took place in the presence of a large crowd representative of public men, railroad officers and employees, business men and others, was broadcast over Canada through the facilities of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

Those who attended the local unveiling heard the addresses at the station by Miller Brog and among the speakers were W. G. Atkinson, General Chairman, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, Eastern Division, Canadian National Railways, and secretary-treasurer of the general committee which handled the memorial project; H. B. Chase, Assistant Grand Chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers; W. G. Graham, General Chairman of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen; Thomas Todd, Vice President of the Order of Railway Conductors; C. P. Lockwood, General Chairman of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen; W. H. Phillips, Vice President of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers; D. R. Holby, Secretary-treasurer of the Canadian National System Federated Shop Trades, representing the international associations of machinists, boiler-makers, blacksmiths, sheet metal workers, steamfitters, carmen and associated staff, and William Crampton, General Chairman of the International Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and associated crafts.

The broadcast from Ottawa was unique in many respects. As a background there could be heard the muffled noises of a railway station, with locomotives puffing on the tracks and streams of passengers hurrying to and from their trains. Each speaker told part of the history of the railroad activities of the former president of the National System.

Explaining the steps which had led up to the erection of the memorial tablets, W. G. Atkinson, secretary of the committee said:

"Following the death of the late Sir Henry Thornton, former Chairman and President of the Canadian National Railways and a railroad executive who stood very high in the estimation of every employee of that system, the International standard railroad labor organizations received from their members many demands for some action which would perpetuate the memory of the man who had done so much for the Canadian National System and its employees. As a result, the General Chairmen decided, with the assistance of their respective membership and friends, to erect bronze memorial plaques to honor Sir Henry's memory, at certain places across the Dominion of Canada.

"We are now gathered in Ottawa, the capital city of this Dominion, to unveil the first of these memorials. At the same time, in other places, similar ceremonies are taking place.

"These ceremonies are being carried out by representatives and members of the seventeen standard railroad labor organizations. The cost of the plaques has been met by members of these organizations and their friends who are employees of the Canadian National System. On behalf of the committee I wish to thank all whose assistance made it possible for this project to be carried to a successful conclusion. I desire at this time also to express to the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Corporation the appreciation and sincere thanks of the committee for their assistance and co-operation in providing the facilities through which this broadcast is being brought to the employees of the Canadian National Railways and to the people of Canada."

The plaques which were unveiled are of bronze. At the top is a portrait of the late Sir Henry Thornton in raised profile, surrounded by a garland of maple leaves. The inscription reads as follows:

In memory of Sir Henry W. Thornton, K. B. E., Chairman and President Canadian National Railways, 1922-1932.

Died March 14th, 1933.

This tablet is erected by the employees of The Canadian National Railways.

Fifteen bronze memorial plaques, each 22 inches wide by 32 inches deep and weighing seventy pounds, have been erected. They are located as follows: One each at Halifax and Sydney in Nova Scotia; at Charlottetown, St. John's, Moncton,

# MT. STEWART STUDY GROUPS HEAR ADDRESS

## Interesting Discussion Follows Lecture By Mr. Bertram Fowler.

The Associated Study Clubs of Mount Stewart met last night at St. Andrews Hall to hear Mr. Bertram B. Fowler, author of the well-known book "Consumer Cooperation in America," speak on the aim of the cooperative movement in developing throughout the continent.

Mr. Cyrene MacDonald as chairman introduced the speaker to the audience.

Mr. Fowler outlined the situation facing the ordinary man in the economic world. A vicious system based on what is nothing less than the law of the jungle has subverted and disturbed the normal relations of people which should be one of harmony and fellowship.

"We are losing the finest things in democracy by permitting such a condition to exist which is good neither for exploiter or exploited," the speaker said. The only ethical, the only religious, way out is through cooperative effort.

Referring to the growth of cooperative societies in Great Britain, Mr. Fowler paid credit to them for building a magnificent business, though it is lacking in individual consciousness of the movement as a way of life. More sound is the Swedish development, based on small discussion circles, or the Danish movement rising out of the folk school. Individual understanding of the underlying philosophy of cooperation is necessary for success and group study gives this.

The wreckage of improperly founded cooperatives is strewn all over America, even in P.E.I., failing because every member was not educated in the deep spiritual and social meaning behind the movement. People know now how to build on sure and safe principles the ideal of economic christianity.

There is no room for hatred and resentment; if things are not working for the good of people in a democracy the only procedure is to set about changing them. The speaker cited many examples of cooperative enterprises through the country. The possibilities in Canada for cooperation are immense. Here are a poor people, bolder, more cohesive than European, who have great resources to develop.

The adult education technique of the Maritimes has culled the best from the European methods. People here have all the materials to build an island paradise, and need only straight thinking and determination to carry it out.

An interesting discussion followed, entered into by Rev. Father McCormick, Mr. Cyrene MacDonald, Mr. Temple Murphy, Mr. Will Ross, Mr. James Doyle, Mr. John Egan, on topics such as credit union management, and marketing problems.

# New Air Service Will Open Monday

MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 17.—Permission to operate a proposed Maritime Air Service has been received from Ottawa by the Eastern Canada Air Lines, Ltd., with headquarters in this city. R. T. McCully, managing director announced this afternoon.

The company has imported five new planes from England and these have been assembled and tested at the local airport.

Mr. McCully announced that, on Monday next, the company will inaugurate three services—between Moncton and Saint John, between Moncton, New Glasgow and Halifax, and between Halifax, New Glasgow and Charlottetown.

Major Stuart Graham, inspector of civil aviation, who was here to test the pilots in blind flying, was unable to complete the tests owing to weather conditions and is returning this afternoon to Ottawa.

Nanking's reports from the Shensi battlefield pictured uninterrupted successes for the loyal divisions encircling the rebel capital, and officials indicated Marshal Chang's readiness to negotiate was due in part to his desperate military situation.

were wounded and several were taken prisoners," said the Junta spokesman. "I can't give you the figures now."

The fighting has started there again and the insurgents are obviously trying desperately to extend their flanks and take the road to El Escorial.

"But the Germans seem to find the government lines are hard to smash as did the Moors."

Apparently the Boadilla action was part of a wide offensive by General Francisco Franco, the insurgent commander. Other fighting was in progress in northern University City, and from the north-east, insurgent troops were moving toward Madrid.

Government commanders believed Franco next would try to drive a wedge between Madrid and Valencia, the new seat of government to the south-east.

Madrid counted 63 dead and more than 200 wounded as the result of yesterday's air raid, which ended in a spectacular aerial battle between scores of insurgent and government planes. Four enemy pursuit planes and one bomber were shot down, the government command asserted.
