by the Privy Council in favor of the Provinces. The Dominion had no more ownership in the oysters than in the lobsters which they do not claim. They had no more right to the oysters than to the products of our fields. The Province should maintain to the last its right of ownership and not take the Dominion as a partner. It was finally agreed that the House should at an early day further consider the matter in committee of the whole.

THE PREMIER in reply to Mr. Mathieson said the committee were engaged in preparing a memorial for the early appointment of a Judge. The memorial had not yet been forwarded.

DR. WARBURTON moved the House into Committee to amend a clause in the bill incorporating the Arena Rink Company so as to provide for a capital of \$35,000 instead of \$20,000. The House adjourned till 8 o'clock.

EVENING SESSION. The House resumed its sitting at 8.40. HON. MR. RICHARDS moved the second reading of the bill to establish a Central Farmers' Institute, and the House in committee, with Mr. McPhee in the chair proceeded to consider the same.

The incorporators are Rev. P. C. Gauthier, T. S. Robertson, E. B. McLaren, Artemas Moffatt, Edward Bullpitt, Peter Brodie, Frank Halliday, Percy Marchbank, Joseph Taylor, W. H. McGregor.

HON. MR. RICHARDS explained the object, and that the bill was framed in pursuance of a resolution and constitution prepared by representatives of the Farmers' Institutes, Fruit Growers' Association, the Dairymen's Association and the Poultry Association. The bill provides for one member for each Institute and one additional member for every 25 members, with two each from the other associations named.

A conversational discussion ensued in which Mr. Delaney, Mr. Dewar, Mr. Crosby, Mr. Mathieson, the Speaker, Hon. L. McDonald, Mr. Arsenault, Mr. Irving, Mr. Hughes, the Premier, Hon. Mr. McLean, Hon. Mr. Cummiskey and Mr. Dobie took part. It transpired that the number of members in different Institutes ranged from 30 to over 200. Some members favored limiting the larger Institutes to four members, but did not move to amend the bill to that effect.

MR. McKINNON favored paying the railway fares of all the members instead of one for each Institute as provided in the bill. THE PREMIER thought to pay the fares of all the members would involve a heavy tax on the Association.

It was pointed out that the Central Institute had no power given it in the bill to levy any fee upon the Institutes affiliated thereto, and would have no funds except the \$100 which the Government will contribute.

MR. DELANEY thought the Government grant should be increased to \$200, at least until the Institute was firmly established. HON. MR. McMILLAN thought it would be a strange thing to give the Institute twice as much as was asked for.

HON. MR. RICHARDS was not sure this was the amount asked for, but it would be better to let the clause stand until the Institute is established. The clause was further discussed by a number of members. The bill was reported agreed to with an amendment.

A message was received from the Governor transmitting the estimates and the Premier gave notice that he would move the House into committee of supply tomorrow and that the budget speech would be delivered tomorrow evening. The House adjourned till 3 o'clock tomorrow.
