RECORDS TOPPLE IN LABOR DAY RACES

Record As Guy Ann Lowers Heatherbell Breaks Track Maritime 3-year-old Mark

Col. D. A. MacKinnon, President Of Charlotte-town Driving Park, Honoured By Horsemen At Banquet Held Last Evening.

Yesterday morning it looked as though Lady Luck had deserted the horsemen, as rain was falling and there did not seem to be any prospect of the weather clearing up, until eleven o'clock, when the sky brightened and the rain ceased.

The afternoon's sport consisted of the Two-Year-Old, Three-Year-Old and Four-Year-Old Futurities, raced under the auspices of the Prince Edward Island Harness Racing Club, whose activities have resulted in the development of colt training and racing in this Province to a remarkable degree.

New Maritime records have been made this season by Nita Volo in winning the Two-Year-Old Trot and Pace at the Provincial Exhibition in 2:23 1-2 and yesterday afternoon Guy Ann, owned and driven by George A. Callbeck, Summerside, set up a new mark for Maritime bred three-year-olds of 2:16 1-2.

Other highlights of the afternoon were the winning of the Two-Year-Old Futurity by Bud Volo, owned by G. H. Barbour, M. L. A., Alberton, Nita Volo, owned by Mr. Barbour's brother was second in this race. Both these colts were purchased this spring by the Messrs. Barbour practically untrained and have been developed by Harry O'Brien and his son Lloyd, to their present winning form.

The Four-Year-Old Futurity was a straight heat affair for Letta Kalmuck who had too much class for the others and won each heat under a very mild drive.

In the 215 Trot, Lusty Frisco came back to the head lines byumping his opposition into the ground, stepping his second and fastest heat in 2:11 and demonstrating that Mr. Chandler has in the son of San Francisco a very valuable horse.

A pleasant feature of the afternoon was the presentation by Dr. F. C. Dougan of a handsome silver cup to G. H. Barbour, M. L. A., for winning the Two-Year-Old Class with his black stallion Bud Volo.

At last evening a horsemen's banquet was held in the Nobana Tea Rooms, which was presided over by George A. Callbeck, President of the Harness Racing Club and at which were present Mayor P. W. Turner of Charlottetown, Mayor Brewer Robinson of Summerside and over fifty harness horse enthusiasts.

It was made the occasion for the reading of an address to Lt.-Col. D. A. MacKinnon, D. S. O., President of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association and the presentation to him of a magnificent silver loving cup on which are engraved the words: "Presented by the Horsemen of Prince Edward Island to Lt.-Col. D. A. MacKinnon, the King of the Sport of Kings in the Kentucky of Canada."

The Colonel was completely taken by surprise at this kind and beautiful act of his horsemen friends and in the course of his reply stated that of all the many trophies he had won in different lines of activities, there was none that he would prize as much as the Cup presented to him tonight.

The City of Charlottetown rifle shooting championship for 1936 was held at Kensington Rifle Ranch Saturday afternoon. The weather conditions were not of the best as there was a raw cold wind, somewhat gusty, that made difficult shooting. Twelve riflemen turned out to battle for the piece of silverware which first saw competition in 1909, when a group of enthusiasts made up an amount sufficient to buy the cup, the conditions being that it was to be won three times before outright possession could be given.

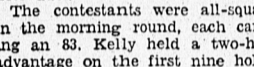
Several times in his career since it has been dangerously near that staple, notably in 1931 when G. M. Moore persuaded Allen McCabe to go out to shoot for it. Allen had contemplated going to the country but changed his mind at Mr. Moore's urging. He won the cup by a point—next in line being Mr. Moore, who if Allen McCabe had carried out his original intention, would have been the possessor of the cup for keeps, as he had two previous wins.

There were some great battles for it in the early days when it was a five range match—200—500—600—800 and 900, with 7 shots at each of the first three ranges and ten shots each at the 800 and 900 yards.

Leut. (now Major) Edgar McCormick was the first recorded winner in 1909. In 1910 Capt. (now Lt.-Col.) D. A. MacKinnon won after a shoot-off with James Landrigan. In 1911 he won again after shoot-off with G. Frank Hutcheson. In 1912 Sgt. G. E. Ritchie won and he won again in 1914. Mr. C. M. Moore won in 1913 and again in 1920, there being no competitions for the cup between the years 1914 and 1920. Q. M. S. A. F. Gormley also had his name placed on the cup twice, winning in 1932 and again in 1933.
