GRAND INFORMAL OPENING OF "BEECH GROVE INN" TONIGHT

Beautiful New Hotel Will be Opened to the Public this Evening All Arrangements Completed for One of the Season's Most Important Social Functions.

A great event in which the citizens of Charlottetown, and the people of Prince Edward Island in general are interested in, takes place tonight at 8.30—it is the grand informal opening of the commodious and magnificent "Beech Grove Inn" situated within two and a half miles from the city, directly facing the entrance to Charlottetown Harbour, and commanding an excellent view of the surrounding country-side.

The grand opening tonight promises to be one of the biggest social functions of the season, in which, no doubt, hundreds of Charlottetown's prominent people will be in attendance. Elaborate preparations have been completed by the management of this new mammoth hotel for this evening's inauguration.

The spacious ballroom has been decorated for the occasion, and the Dixon Orchestra, with the music under the capable and efficient leadership of Professor

SAD DROWNING TRAGEDY AT TWO ARCH BRIDGE

Mr. Owen Curley, of Brookvale, was Drowned Yesterday While Bathing With Two Companions.

Another very sad drowning accident occurred yesterday (Wednesday) at what is known as Two Arch Bridge, between Crapaud and Victoria, when Mr. Owen Curley, of Brookvale, near Kelly's Cross, a young man of twenty-four years of age, who was home from Massachusetts on a visit to his parents, was drowned while bathing with two companions, neither of whom could swim.

The tragedy happened at 3 o'clock in the afternoon when Mr. Curley, wading out beyond his companions, slipped into the channel which is deep at this point of the river, and sank at once. The two young men, one of whom was Mr. Dominick McDonald, of Kelly's Cross, seeing something had happened,

waded out as far as possible but were unable to save their friend. News of the terrible event quickly spread and a large crowd gathered. After many efforts the body was recovered, about 6 o'clock, in five feet of water near the scene of the drowning. Dr. Boyer, coroner of Crapaud, was called and after viewing the remains pronounced an inquest unnecessary.

For the bereaved parents of the unfortunate man the entire province will feel the deepest sympathy. The deceased was of unblemished character and popular with young and old. He followed the trade of electrical welder in Massachusetts and was a skilled workman. The sad event has cast a gloom of sorrow over the entire community.

EIGHTH ANNUAL CONVENTION WOMEN'S INSTITUTES

A Good Attendance at Opening Yesterday. Inspiring Meeting Last Night.

The opening session of the eighth annual convention of the Women's Institutes was held in the Kindergarten Hall yesterday afternoon with a good attendance. Miss Bessie Carruthers, supervisor, presided. After singing of the opening chorus Mr. Wilfred Boulter of the Department of Agriculture welcomed the delegates in a fitting address of which was replied to by Miss Nellie Green of Graham's Road. Mrs. Walter Simpson of Bay View read an interesting paper on the duties of delegates. The reading of branch reports, appointment of nominating committees, and registration was taken up. Of special interest is the report of the work of the Women's Institute, read at the afternoon session by Miss Bessie Carruthers, which appears elsewhere in the Guardian.

Evening Session.

The evening session which was held in Prince of Wales College Hall, was ably presided over by Mrs. Wm. Ives of Montague and was most inspiring and entertaining meeting. Despite the excessively warm weather there was a good attendance. After the Song Service "Old Time Favorites," conducted admirably by Mrs. Levi Ives, an address on "The Health of the Child" was delivered by Miss E. MacMahon, Red Cross Public Health Nurse. Miss MacMahon told in a very interesting way how the Red Cross work started and how the health of the children is being looked after today. She also outlined the work of the Red Cross in the future and showed how the good work is to be continued and enlarged.

Crerar Talks Free Trade

(Special to The Guardian.) YORKTON, Sask., July 13.—Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the new progressive party, accompanied by Dr. Michael Clarke, M. P., addressed a large gathering of voters in the MacKenzie Constituency here yesterday. Mr. Crerar advocated a policy of free trade and suggested a friendly approach to the United States Government so that the market for a large part of Canadian agricultural products should not be closed to them.

France Stays on Rhine

PARIS, July 13.—France has informed Germany she will continue the occupation of the Rhine region until Germany has complied with the conditions of the treaty of Versailles relative to the punishment of those who violated the rules of civilized warfare in the world war. Premier Briand told the Senate today. Replying to a question he characterized the findings of the Leipzig court as "scandalous."

CAR RAN AMUCK.

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 13.—A motor car ran wild through a 12th of July crowd at Burt's Corner Tuesday and injured some seven or eight people, one of whom, a little girl was quite seriously hurt. An inexperienced driver at the wheel was responsible for the accident.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 13.—The assistance of Premier Meighen in securing the attendance of Sir Douglas Haig at the Great War Veterans pageant in September or October has been requested by cablegram which was despatched yesterday to the Canadian Prime Minister.

8,000 Drug Addicts
Estimated in Canada

OTTAWA, July 13.—That Canada has 8,000 drug addicts is regarded as a fairly conservative statement by the Deputy Minister of Health. A continuous fight against this evil is kept up by the Health Department. They are operating with the Mounted Police and the Customs officials in checking the smuggling and illicit traffic of narcotics, and they also assist physicians throughout the Dominion in standardizing the medical treatment of drug addicts as carried out in the special hospital in New York City. To this end the Health Department supplies physicians and others interested with an outline in French or English of treatment given there. The authorities admit that in case of sickness or trouble the discharged patients are very likely to return to the drug. As long as narcotics can be obtained clandestinely, there will be drug addicts to deal with.

Pacific Conference May Detain Premier Meighen Until August

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, July 13.—Premier Meighen would much prefer to be in a position to return to Canada by Aug. 1, for the disarmament conference. As the representative of Canada however, which, perhaps more than any other part of the empire, has an interest in the Pacific, and also as the hardest fighter for the conference of all Imperial statesmen, he realizes that it would be wrong and impossible for him to absent himself from the Pacific conference, no matter when or where it is held. The question, of course, is not definitely decided although the present outlook appears to favor London instead of Washington.

LONDON, July 13.—The disarmament conference continues to be the most prominent of discussion, dividing honours between the Irish Prime Minister, who is expected to return to London that all the nations invited will accept, and as the French Premier, M. Briand, seems already to have decided to go to Washington. It is considered all the more likely that the British Prime Minister will also go, always provided that the state of affairs at home at that time will permit his absence and that his health will permit him to make the trip, as there has been talk of the premier taking a long rest in Switzerland, by advice of his physicians.

Much interest is shown in the question as to whether Germany and Russia will be invited to send delegates to the conference, and in the unobated press comment increasing attention is bestowed on the fact that invitations are not confined to those powers especially interested in Pacific problems, but go also to France and Italy, which, it is held, will introduce the more complex problem of general disarmament, military as well as naval.

LONDON, July 13.—(Canadian Associated Press.) The Prince of Wales has declined all public engagements during August and September in order to obtain a much needed rest before his visit to India. Last week during the celebrations in Lancashire Lord Derby declared that the prince must for his health's sake lead a less strenuous life for a time.

Toronto is on The Frying Pan

(Special to The Guardian.) TORONTO, July 13.—At noon today the Observatory reported an official temperature of 94 degrees and predicted a repetition of the hot weather of last week for at least the next two days. Nothing can stop it. The weather man declared, "We are on the frying pan of the continent again and all the burners have been turned on full." Like a frying pan in shape is the territory affected which extends almost from James Bay to the Gulf of Mexico extending to the west to include California. The humidity that hangs over days and nights for the past two weeks, shows a more benignant mood at noon today, having dropped from 73 at 8 a. m. to only 41 at noon. High temperatures prevail all over Ontario.

Japan Government Favorably Inclined To Conference

(Special to The Guardian.) TOKYO, July 13.—The Japanese foreign office today stated informally the favorable attitude of the Japanese Government toward the principle of disarmament. The government, however, is not ready as yet to make a direct statement regarding its position toward the proposed Washington Disarmament Conference. The Japanese press, the commercial organizations and the public generally are favorable to Japan entering the Conference but the political leaders are rather indefinite in their answers, wishing to know the course of the conference before committing themselves.
