Dr. McLellan's Address

The following is the address delivered by the Rector, Rev. Dr. McLellan: During the scholastic year just closed, there were two hundred and forty-one students enrolled at St. Dunstan's. Of this number ninety-three followed the Arts Course, forty were engaged in Commerce and Business, and one hundred and eight did High School work. While the attendance was not so large as in the preceding year, when there was a large number of returned men following the different courses, yet the average attendance for the whole term was nearly as great, and the graduating class of today, numbering twenty-three members is the largest in the history of the institution. As regards attendance, the year just closed was very satisfactory as our present accommodations were taxed to their fullest capacity and in fact our class rooms were frequented some of the classes.

duty to make knowledge articulate with his surroundings. He cannot be a recluse, totally absorbed in books and oblivious of the progress of the world; nor on the other hand can he break with the traditions of the past and the truths that have survived in every age nor showed he expect the solution of all things in some new scientific discovery. Scientific research is invaluable for the material and industrial progress of a country and especially of a country of such immense natural resources as Canada possesses, for only through the most scientific development of our resources can we hope to successfully compete in the commercial world. Hence every encouragement should be given to an exhaustive study in this direction and opportunities furnished to young men to train themselves in this necessary means for the development of our country. Hence the necessity of enlarged opportunities for the study of the Sciences. And in this connection it is our earnest hope, that under favorable conditions, we shall be able to begin next year the erection of a new Sciences Building, where students may be trained in the fundamentals of the Sciences and given and opportunity of preparing themselves for the advantages of higher courses in scientific research.
